I have the honor to inform
your Royal Highness, that when my arrival at Brighton
on Thursday night, I waited upon Mr Hanby, and
used every argument in my power to convince him
of what appeared at Brighton to my mind; and
that there was the most apparent evidence against
Mr Danton in regard to the letter; that it was the
opinion of most of the British responsibility,
that in case of his being brought to a Court
Martial, he would most speedily be taken —

Doctor Whalley offers to make both to recite the
words contained in the letter your Royal Highness
did on the hour to show me at Bognor -

Mr Dunster offers to make both as punctually to
the contrary - I asked Lord Robert Manners to
be present at this interview knowing I had nothing
to do in the business, and I wished much for
a respectable person to be present as a witness -

Mr Marby has requested that I would allow
him till Friday before he communicates with
me upon this subject -

Send me to inform your Royal Highness
that I will exert myself to the utmost
