My Dear Colonel

As I suppose the Prince will

be in Town by the time this reaches you. I beg you will
spare H: R: H: from me ~~as~~ that I feel as I ought to
do the support & countenance with which He has been
pleased to honour dear Derry.

I see a paragraph in the Papers, relating that
it is H: R: His Intention, as soon as Dr C. Fox's Removal
is over to return again with the North, & complete
his intended tour. I should hardly conceive that
likely at this advanced season of the year. Our
leaves are now falling from the trees & every place

in the North has now lost all its Beauties.

If however the News paper is right & H: h: H: really does
mean to return, I shall feel myself particularly obliged to you
if you will inform me of it, & most particularly if H: h: H:
has any intention of going as far North as this. Our Company
are scattered at a great distance - they are at this
season of the year leaving the Country to go Southward, when
I would induce them to stay if they were certain H: h: H: intended
to leave this part of the Kingdom with his present, &
besides very highly respecting for the reception of such a
guest, are not to be prevailed without sending to London for him.

Some time ago Lord Hawke wrote me word that he
would appoint Capt: Copper Barroch Master of Newcastle.
I find the present - Barroch Master is to leave that place

in about ten days, & as neither Capt: Goppin nor myself, have
had any news on this subject, do we so hard as to acquire
about this appointment, & let me know how the battle stand.

I congratulate you on the capture of the five Dragoons
from the French, & shall be very happy to congratulate your
father, if the R: of Naples will afford me the opportunity, of
a victory gained by his troops over the French. The English
are celebrating, as well as L: H. Hukinson in Egypt, I have
found that they are not invincible, & I pray they have
as little stomach to digest a Neapolitan, as an English
Regiment if it is properly adressed at.

I have been so often told the Post is waiting, whilst
I have been writing this letter, that you don't excuse all
irregularities, & omissions. See they bear no credit to
you for their delay in your's most faithfully
