Your Royal Highness's
Highness, for the late of the War, &
accept a very short acknowledgment
in return for your most kind letter.

I had no time in speaking to Lord
Grenville about Lord Melbourne. He
assured me that there was no intention

of making what is called a batch of
Peers at present. All that had been
proposed to the King was to give Se-
-veral Peers to Lords Capillis &
Breadalbane, so that they might not
be obliged to occupy places in the Peers
-teen to the exclusion of other friends.
This limitation applies equally to

I can in strict confidence tell your
Royal Highness that this substance
was necessitated by the dissatisfaction
of the King at the address with
which the Dissolution was prepared.

I will endeavor tomorrow to

present only add the expression of
heart-felt joy at the accounts
here recd of your Royal Highness's
health.
