My Dear Colored

I thank you for your two letters of the 19.th
and 24.th I confess I thought it might, that the Prince should know
how sincerely the Report in the Brazils was attached to this
Country. It may be therefore of some use hereafter, if H: R: H: would
keep up some little correspondence with him, & as I had this information
from the fountain head, I can depend upon its correctness. Throw for
certain that nothing would please the Prince of Brazil so much, as
the Prince's Picture, if H: R: H: would send it over & present to
him, with a handsome letter, which he might easily do, thro' Lord
Shayford. The Report I am sure would lay it up in his State Apartment
& be very proud of it; & should they get into a friendly correspondence, attached
as the Prince of Brazil would be to him, H: R: H: might hereafter
find it upon some occasion or other highly useful to him, when he shall
be upon the Brazils to be able to correspond with him, as a friend, without
its giving this the suspicion of his enemies. The Prince of Brazil
has a very good, & gratefully hearty & won'd I can assure you, temper
by little civility the Prince might be inclined to show him.

I suppose whilst I am writing this, they are hard at work endeavoring
to procure me the present Darien Doctor; & when they have so done, where
Colonel Beecham

will they find better? Will those who neglected their allies, & left them
in the lurch in Ireland, who planned the childish expedition to
Constabrigia, or forced the Queen of conspiracy Egypt will in her spite
of her, do any better? I am certain that the treacherous H. R. H.
received from Her when in Dover, & the language I hear they ~~had~~
have told about him since they are out of Dover, will not induce
him by any means to leave Her again at the head of affairs. He has found
her true, who will promise much, & do very little.

I trust by you to present my duty to H. R. H., & assure him of
my most ardent attachment.

I have the pleasure to say, that I now begin to see some little
improvement in the health of Lady Elizabeth, & as it appears to me or
so very gradually, I trust it will be lasting. As to myself, I do not expect
to be better, till I leave this place. The Duke, my daughter, & myself
write in compliance to you & H^M Queen below. Adieu
