

Lord C. Bentinck to Col. Macdonald
10. May 1810.

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Lord Charles Bentinck presents his Compliments
to Colonel Macdonald on thinking over what he said
to him this morning, & has occurred to him that though
His Royal Highness said he could not give the arms &
at the moment ask for their being ~~sent~~ legally worn, he has
not commanded that they should be taken off the Carriage.
He therefore hesitates to take a step which will cause so
much Conversation, till he understands it is His Royal
Highness's wish. — Lord Charles is sorry to trouble
