The Lord Chancellor having expressed a wish
that the Prince of W. shd. reduce to writing the substance
of the conversation he has just had with the P. of W.
The Prince is compelled to remind his Lordship
that the shortness of the time (it being now eleven
o'clock and the interview being appointed for
twelve) renders it impossible to do more than
to state the result of that which the Prince
detailed at length to his Lordship. That result
is that the information the P. has received from
quarters upon which he is bound to place the
most implicit reliance makes it ~~impossible~~
for him to believe that the proposed interview
could lead to that cordial, affectionate and
lasting reconciliation which the Lord Chancellor
must recollect was the sole object which the
Prince professed to have in view. Deeply impressed

with a view of the consequences which might result from any but the most satisfactory meeting with his majesty, having in the course of two months received no one mark of the royal extremity kindness for which he had so anxiously looked, & being extremely agitated and even indisposed by the continued state of suspense in which he has so long been kept, nothing but the certainty that he was to throw himself at the feet of an affectionate father considerable time, with safety to his own character, to appear before the king. Unhappily the information he has very recently received forbids him to look for the king's affection, & impels with that death principle idea, he thinks it most prudent to avoid an interview, which might only irritate a mind it has been the sole anxious wish of his heart to soften & conciliate. May God

his regret that the Chancellor declines making
this communication to his Majesty in person.

The extreme agitation into which the near
approach of the interview with his Majesty
has thrown the Prince, under the
circumstances which have recently come
to his knowledge, has created a degree of
indisposition which renders it impossible for
him to present himself before the King this
day. The P. entreats the Chancellor to make
this communication to his Majesty.
