His Majesty has, next to doing his Duty, nothing more at Heart, than that the Arrangement for the due Care of the Person and Education of his dear Grand Daughter the Princess Charlotte, should be settled to the Satisfaction of all Parties, of which He will give the fullest Proof, as he finds the Prince of Wales doubts the Idea of the Lords of Barons Save, whom the King would most undoubtedly have named as Governors, if the Appointment had respected one of his own Daughters. His Majesty however waives the Idea on the present Occasion: and after the severe Loss, which she has sustained within these few days, a doubt might reasonably be entertained
