

- 1/ Lord Mowbray to the Chancellor expressing ^{the} ^{Princes} ^{desire} to transmit the
Princess Charlotte to the Army's sole care. 17th July 1804
- 2/ From the Secretary to the Chancellor, enclosing Instructions as to the
language to be used to the Prince on conversation or writing. Nov 23rd
- 3/ From the Chancellor to the Prince enclosing Patterns of Plans of Education.

- 4/ From the Prince to the Chancellor, referring to what had passed between
Lord Mowbray, Mr Pitt & the Chancellor, & desiring that all future communications
may pass thro' Lord Mowbray. — 24th Nov 1804
- 5/ From the Chancellor to the Prince stating the above Papers to have been
received from the Army, desiring to know whether he is to return them to the
Princess & desiring that any thing stated as proposed by the King is inconsistent
with what the Chancellor had learnt from Lord Mowbray. 27th Nov 1804
- 6/ From the Prince to the Chancellor stating the latter's declaration
to lay this letter of the 24th before the King, denying every idea of disrespect
towards his Majesty, but declaring that the warmest assistance & cooperation which
he could give to the King should relinquish the care, custody & Education of his Daughter.
Denying that Lord Mowbray's letter, from the subsequent explanations which passed
would admit the conclusion drawn from it, & stating that he had no objection
at all. — That he with respect to Lord Mowbray the letters of the Chancellor & Mr Pitt
& Lord Mowbray could alone clear up any misunderstanding, if in fact such existed.
Observing that the King had more often to consult Lord Mowbray on the subject.

- 8/ From Lord Mowbray to the Chancellor stating that he was to attend the
Prince at 10 on the 21 Dec 1804

9/ From the Prince to the Chancellor, stating that he had understood the King was waiting for an answer to a Paper delivered on 23^d Nov. That he had answered it on the 24th Nov, referring to the contents of his answer & dwelling upon the import, of the word *repression* used in Lord Mordaunt's letter, which had been fully explained & verbally affirmed that had been disregarded in the Arrangements proposed. 23^d Decr 1684

10/ From the King to the Chancellor, sending a Paper to be delivered to the Prince & a copy ^{to be sent to} Lord Mordaunt 31st Decr 1684

11/ From the Prince ^{to the Chancellor} expressing his sense of the explanations sent by the King. His readiness to share with His Majesty the Execution of the Princes's Charter but declining all Interference respecting His Majesty, establishing a distinction in the expression of Parents between Father & Mother as explaining the latter, according to the Petition moved by the King, & expressing a hope that he shall be able to concur in the Details when transacted 3^d Janry 1685

12/ From the King to the Chancellor stating his satisfaction at the Receipt of the Princes's Act of 23^d & his Intention to proceed with as little Delay as possible in the Choice of the Persons necessary for the Education necessary for the Care & Instruction of the Princes's Charter. 5th Janry 1685

13/ From the Prince acknowledging the Receipt of the Chancellor's letter transmitting a copy of His Majesty's of the 5th Janry — 7th Janry 1685

14/ From the Chancellor to the Prince without state enclosing a Paper from the King which appears to have been sent on the 17th Janry & to contain the proposed Selection. —

15/ From the Prince to the Chancellor, acknowledging the Receipt of the preceding Act, & requesting that one Article may be reconsidered upon grounds which would be stated verbally by Lord Mordaunt to the Chancellor. 10th Janry 1685

16 / From the King, waiving the appointment of Baroness Howe & proposing in his stead Baroness de Clifford as governess under the Convention that she would be agreeable to the Prince - No Date -

17 / From the Prince to the Chancellor, expressing his sense of the King's consideration in altering the contents of his letter that the footing upon which the Princess now stands will remove all further difficulty - 20 June 1805

18 / From the King authorizing the Chancellor to inform the Prince that Lord Campbell had accepted the place of sub-governor, his approbation of Lady De Clifford taking charge of the Princess Charlotte & of his recommending a lady as deputy sub-governor. Feb 9 1805

19 / From the Prince to the Chancellor stating that he will as early as possible introduce Lady de Clifford to the Princess Charlotte, but that he has some objections to offer, when Lord Moira arrives in Town. Feb 14. 1805

20 / From the King to the Chancellor stating that as the transaction is now happily concluded, he cannot conceive what further arrangements are to be made - Feb 20 1805

21 / From the King authorizing the Chancellor to state to the Prince that the apartments at Windsor will be ready for the Reception of the Princess Charlotte in two weeks & that notice will then be given to Lady De Clifford for her removal thence. March 1st 1805

22 / From the Prince to the Chancellor acknowledging Receipt of his letter & stating that he will in consequence submit a Paper to his Majesty March 11th 1805

23 / From Lord Moira to the Chancellor, stating the Prince's intention to submit certain Points of Government to the King's own Judgement so as to preclude all appearance of Alteration. 2nd March 1805

24/ From the Duke of Exeter having nothing to the Chancellor by order of
the King & authority of the Prince a sealed Paper, received from the
Prince for his Majesty. - 12th March 1685

25/ From the King, returning to the Chancellor, as proposing his
approbation of the Business relating to the Case & Education of the
Prince having been stated to his confidential Person for these Papers
March 20th 1685

26/ From the King, to be delivered by the Chancellor to the Prince
agreeing to the Prince, wishes that the Prince should
remain with the Prince during his usual Residence in Town &
with his Majesty in the Summer, leaving the Period of Residence at
London from June to January - 20th - 1685

27/ From the Chancellor stating that he has put into the Court,
hands the Papers which regard the expenses - no date.

28/ From the Prince acknowledging the Receipt of his Majesty,
Paper of 10th 1685. Stating that all Communications having
passed thro' Lord Moira, he cannot find an immediate Business
that some three Communications various Circumstances have arisen
which together with some parts of his Majesty's Note require a
clear explanation & that all Proceedings must be suspended until
Lord Moira is arrived in London. - 12th Decr 1685

29/ From Lord Moira to the Chancellor, stating generally that he
had seen the two last Communications that had passed, that he is assured
that the King would not mean a Resurrection which would annul the Terms
of the Proposal he had designed to make as well as former Points
materially understood, and if he is right in such Construction that he
is certain there cannot be any Difficulty in settling all Business
to the King, wishes, & stating his Readiness to confer with the
Chancellor on the Subject when he shall return to Town - 31st Decr 1685
