With infinite pleasure, My Dear
Father, I beg your Command in
writing. We arrived here a quarter of five
after a very hot & long journey. I was
almost broiled, & shall most likely
carry the marks in my face for a
long time, indeed I expect to get
nothing from you on my return
for taking so little care of my
skin. Thama-de (Wifford) was almost
dead with the heat & I was
sick the whole way. If it were
not for leaving you in I don't know

be quite glad to have ^{left} London for
the country is in the greatest
beauty possible. This place is delight-
fully quiet, the cool sea breeze
& the fine weather is a very good
change after having been in
London. The Pucey only arrived
yesterday morning so that I cannot
drive till tomorrow.

Providence is Sunday and very full,
there is nobody I know here
except Lady Jarvis took a walk
at Mr. Pucey's house at 11 o'clock
with the Arsons. The band
of the Bedford Militia arrived
today & they will play to me at
dinner time tomorrow for the first

for time. I hope Mr. Tyron is not
 the worse for his exertions on
 Friday, but Mr. Blumberg for
 his time. As to Paddy Bloomfield
 I shall write to him tomorrow
 but he will be in the predicament
 when I am driving.

I believe I must conclude
 as I fear I intrude upon your
 time & my letter is too long
 to lengthen it. B. de C. sends
 his duty. Give my kind love
 to Ernest
