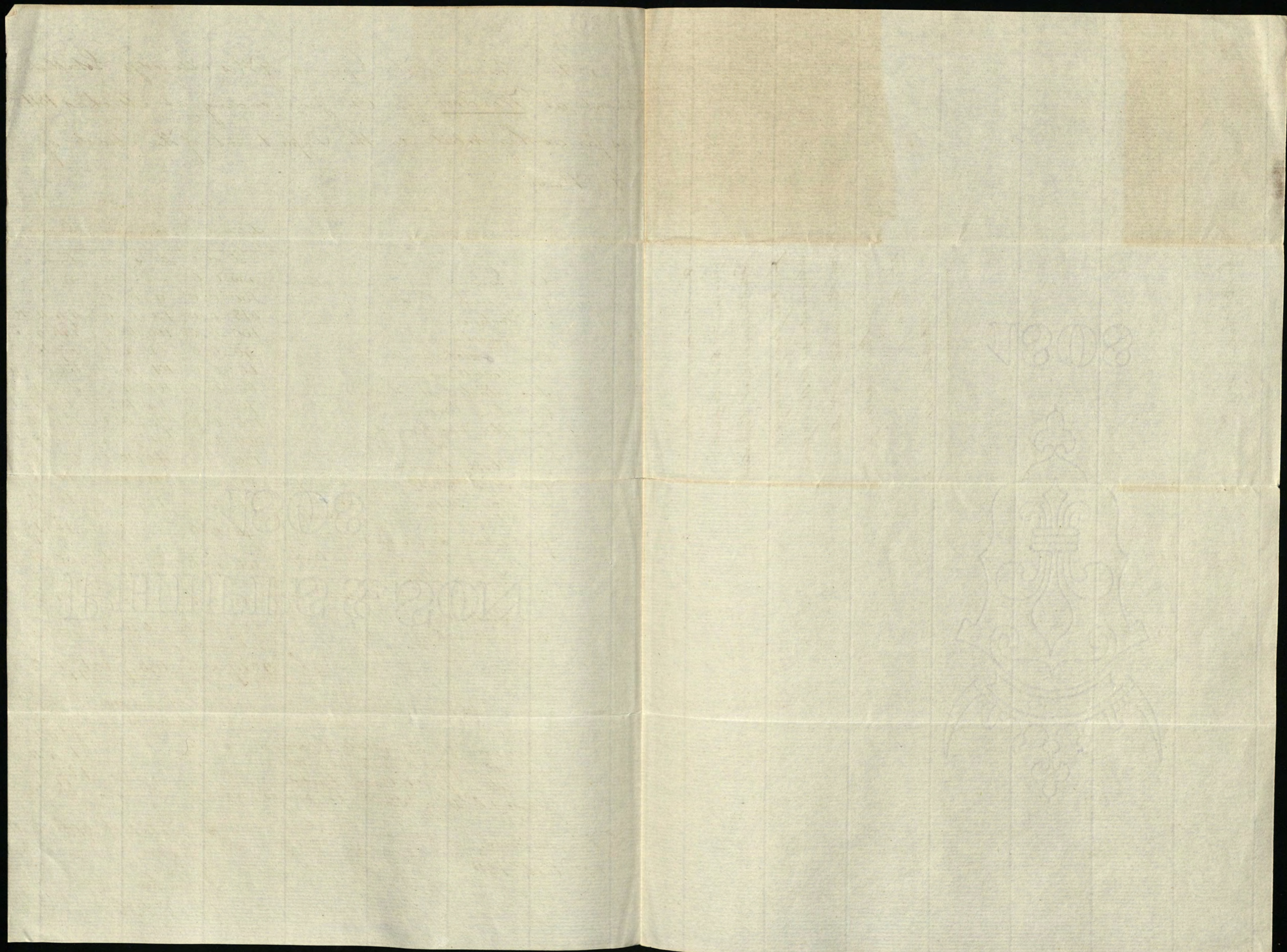

Memorandum Relative to the Disposal of the King's Papers
Windsor Castle - December, 23^d. 1841.

The Correspondence and Papers bearing Dates from December 1805 to November 1810 have been progressively arranged by Colonel Taylor, and deposited in Boxes under the Windows in the further Room of His Majesty's Library in Windsor Castle.

The Correspondence for the Months of Colonel Taylor's Attendance in 1805, namely since 13^t July, were not regularly given to him, but were received in the course of subsequent Searches, and, as far as was possible, deposited with the Rest, some few loose Letters excepted, which were found at more recent Periods & deposited in other Boxes.

An Arrangement of Papers was made in the Summer of 1800, in consequence of a private Search for some former Correspondence on Subjects which had recurred. - These Papers were delivered to Colonel Taylor by His Majesty, in great Number from various Boxes, Table Drawers, Bureaus, Boxes &c., - some of mixed Periods and Dates, some anterior to His Majesty's Reign, & in irregular Groups to 1805 - 6. - They are Official

and

and Private, English, French & German, but the Proportion of the latter is small. — These were all docketed and arranged by Col. Taylor according to date & deposited in the before named Boxes in the Library.

A further Arrangement was begun in the Months of April and May 1781 of all the Papers, Official and Private of every Description & completed after Colonel Taylor's immediate Attendance upon His Majesty had ceased.

This Arrangement comprehended Letters and Papers of various Date which His Majesty had withheld, or which had escaped His Notice during the previous Searches of the Boxes &c. in the Lower Apartments; — Also Papers (chiefly German) found in some Tables or Bureaus in the State Apartments, Documents, Printed and Manuscript, relating to Domestic Establishments and Departments, Political, Financial & Military State of Foreign Countries, Reports from the Electorate of Hanover, Military & Civil; Returns English & German & Miscellaneous Documents of various Description; — Of Mixed Periods & Dates; — Some anterior to His Majesty's Reign & Prospecies with greater or lesser Intervals to 1785-6. — This Search also produced a large Proportion of Army ^{Lists} Returns, arranged in

in Bottles, others loose; also Books of various Descriptions,
Plans, Maps, Prints & Architectural Drawings, Surveys,
a small Proportion of Minerals, Medals & Coins, some
Telescopes &c. &c. - and five Boxes containing Quills &
Seals.

The whole of these have been arranged with
the Assistance of Mr Bott Senior, Mr Smart, & Mr Kelly
[the Bay's Son].

The English Private & Ministerial Correspondence
German & French Papers & Family Letters were arranged
by Colonel Taylor according to Subjects and Dates and
Deposited in a Black Box of which Colonel Taylor has
the only Key and which also contains some Presents
from the Grand Signor, recently unpacked. - The
Family Correspondence sealed up. -

The ^{Army} Returns, including the greater
Proportion which had been deposited at the Queen's
Palace & which are understood to be complete from
1760, were, by His Majesty's Command, sent in May
1781 to the Adjutant General's Office down to 1799
inclusive. Those from 1800 to the present Period were
sorted and arranged by Messrs Smart, Bott and Kelly
& are deposited in a large Deal Box, of which Col. Taylor

L. M.

Mr Bott Junior has each a Key. — His Box and another of nearly the same size contain further, such Books & Books as were not moved to the Library (while the Loan of His Majesty's Key afforded Access to the Library Boxes) also a Collection of the Architectural & other Drawings, Surveys, some Maps and a Variety of Printed Documents & Manuscript Books and Papers of inferior Importance; — All sorted & arranged as far as the Subjects admitted; — Also sundry loose Articles of various Nature which had been withdrawn from other Boxes during the Search for Papers.

The Quills were sorted by Mr John Bott, and Schedules being made, were replaced in the Boxes which originally contained them, of which Mr John Bott has the Keys. — The Number does not correspond with the Specification in the Original Schedules; and it is presumed that Messrs Hill & Strong have those wanting.

Some other Articles, viz, Two Turkish Swords, some Telescopes &c &c are under the Charge of Mr Bott Junior. — Six Turkish Muskets & Rifles, recently unpacked, are in the Library.

Hence it will appear that the Articles to which Colonel Taylor has Access are the Contents of the large

large Black Chest and of the Two large Deal Chests, containing Papers, Books and other Articles, as already described, produced by the last Search. — These three Chests are in the Passages leading to the King's Private Apartment.

Mr John Bott has Access to the Two large Deal Chests above-named & to the Boxes containing Deeds.

The Articles under Charge of Mr Bott, Junior, are secured in the Wardrobe Chests to which he has Access.

The Private Chests in the Library are only accessible with the King's Private Key, now in the Queen's Possession.

That Key also opens ~~also opens~~ a large Book Chest in the Blue Room, containing chiefly Books on Agriculture; another smaller one containing Handel's Works, a Table with Drawers containing the Medals, Coins & Minerals and a few other trifling Articles. — It opens the several Chests and Bureaus in his Majesty's Bed Room and Dressing Room, in which there are no Papers of much import, excepting the small Chest nearish the Chimney which contains the Papers relating to the Enquiry into the Prince of Wales's Conduct.

The same Key opens every other Chest throughout the Apartments, those in the Windows of the Dining

Dining Room and others on that Side, containing Papers
chiefly, German Returns & Accounts. This Key (Col. J. Beliers)
opens also the Bureaus in the State Apartment, which have
been emptied of Papers, and the various Closets, Bureaus
&c. in the Great Lodge, in the Queen's House and at
Kew.

Those in the Queen's House were emptied
by his Majesty's Direction, in May last, by Mr John
Bott and the contents brought to Windsor.

The Deductions, consisting of Property Tax, Land Tax, One Shilling Tax, Sixpenny Tax, and Fees formerly paid at Offices that have been long suppressed, are made, by the Order of the Lords of the Treasury, by the Master of the Horse, and the whole of them are paid by him into the Exchequer.

The Fanning is performed by two Men employed by M^r Field, who is appointed by the Master of the Horse to do the Business (by Contract) of the whole Department.

The Coach Horses are allowed two Bushels of Oats, two Trusses and a half of Hay, two Trusses of Straw, one Bushel of Bran, and one Peck of Beans, and the Footmen's Horses two Bushels of Oats, two Trusses of Hay, two Trusses of Straw, one Bushel of Bran, and one Peck of Beans, each per week; but His Majesty's own Saddle Horses are not on any Allowance, but are fed according to the Discretion of the Foot Groom.

The Forage is supplied by Purveyors appointed by the Master of the Horse, on a Contract formed at the End of each Quarter, and founded on the Market Prices, & is paid for by the Master of the Horse.

It having occurred that
the only effectual check to the
excessive expenditure in the
Article of Wax Candles would
be the total Extinction of the
Perquisites, or nearly that,
Colonel Taylor submitted to
the Queen the following Re-
-gulations which were approved
and accordingly conveyed to
Lord Winchelsea & Mr Stephenson.

That whole Candles
should be issued every
Evening for the Queen's
Private Apartments and
those in which Her Majesty
receives Her Company; but
that the Remains should,
on the following Morning,

be

be returned into the Store, to
be applied to the Inferior
Apartments, or to light the
Passages leading to the Queen
and the Princesses' Rooms.

That the Princesses having
stated that they had occasion
for only four Candles (instead
of six actually issued for
their Rooms) and that even
these are only in small

part consumed, it is proposed
that four Candles only
should be issued for each
of their Apartments and
should be considered as
issued for two or three Evenings
use according to the Season.

That the Candles for the
Royal Duke's Apartments
should be issued under
the

N. 13. It has frequently been
the Practice of the Princesses
Pages to receive the whole Candles
issued for one Evening's use and
to place only the Ends of others
in their Royal Highnesses' Rooms
and very often not to supply
any for the outer Rooms. These
for the Passages (altho' issued
whole) have been either so
short or so soon extinguished
as to leave the Passages dark
at an early Hour.

the same Regulation, but if they staid only one Night, the Remains should be returned on the following Morning to the Store.

That Candles should be issued to The Ladies and Visitors, in the Proportion of two to each Individual, not two to each Room as at present and should serve for two or more Evenings use.

That the Passages (those leading to the Queens' and Princesses' Rooms excepted) should be lighted with Spermacite Oil from which there is no smell, instead of Wax.

That the Regulations which apply to the Apartments

of

of the Royal Family should
be subject to such ^{occasional} Inspection
as they should deem proper
or necessary.

That the Candles in
the Upper Lodge for the
Dining and Sitting Rooms
should be issued whole
and the Remains returned
to Store on the following
Morning. Those for
the Gentlemen's and the
Visitors Rooms on the same
Principle which is applied
to the Apartments of the
Ladies in the Castle, and
that Spermaceti Oil should
be burnt in the Passages
throughout the Building.

As Candles are neces-
sarily burnt in three of
the

The King's Rooms throughout the night, the only Regulation which appears applicable to His Majesty's Apartment is that they shall be issued for such Rooms only as are actually occupied.

— Tables —

It having appeared that, in order to give due effect to the proposed Reform in the waste of Articles issued for Table Consumption it would be necessary to abolish entirely the Perquisites on this head; It was agreed by Lord Winchelsea and Mr. Stephenson that the Remains of each superior Table not required for the supply of the Inferior Tables, should be conveyed to the
Lords

Ladders or a general Store,
placed under due super-
intendance. That the
untouched Articles (hitherto
sold as Perquisites) should
be applied to Luncheons
&c. and brought into general
use. — A Question having
arisen as to the final dis-
posal of the Remnants of
Meat, Bread &c. which
could not be brought into
use for the Household, Colonel
Taylor suggested that these
should be regularly dis-
tributed to the Families
of the Footmen and other
Servants which have
hitherto derived advantage
from the Rations being
issued distinctly to each
Individual

Individual, instead of
 being consolidated for
 immediate consumption
 at one General Table.

That if any broken victuals
 remained in store after
 such Distribution, they should
 be given to the Poor under
 proper management.

This suggestion was approved.

Colonel Taylor has not
 discovered any Official Au-
thority for indirect Perquisites
 and therefore is not aware
 of the necessity of making
 compensation for the loss
 of those here proposed to be
 abolished, excepting in the
 Instance of Mr. Robson, the
 Table Decker at the Upper
 Lodge, whose Superior Salary

(not

(not exceeding £39 nett)
 justifies a Presumption
 that when he was removed
 to the Windsor Establish-
 ment it was intended that
 he should derive emolu-
 ments from certain Per-
 quisites.

The Pages Men, who have
 the Perquisites arising from
 the other Tables, are not offi-
 cially acknowledged as
 forming any part of the
 Establishment.

Additional Note

M^{rs} Powell the Housekeeper
 has a Salary from the Privy
 Purse, as Superintendant of
 the King's Private Apartments
 but none from the Chambe-
 lains Office as Housekeeper
 on any Table. She will lose
 materially from the Abolition
 of Perquisites on Wax Candles

Consideration the Adoption of two or three
Clauses transmitted herewith, which
upon our past Experience, We think
would much simplify and facilitate
the Operation of those Acts. —

Finding that no Doubt can
arise as to the Extent & Nature of the
Trusts reposed in us, only in the Event
of their being some Public Revenue
that is not administered under the last
Clause of the latter Act by Warrants
from the Treasury, which is at present
unknown, — We venture further to
suggest the Propriety of having that
Fact ascertained, and if there be any
Public Revenue of the Crown which is
not administered under that Clause, —
Then, and in that Event only, it appears
to us desirable that such Revenue
should

should, by this future Bill, be declared to be vested in The Commissioners of His Majesty's Real and Personal Estate or elsewhere, so that no Doubt shall continue as to the Persons to whom the Care and Management of that Property is entrusted.

We conceive it to be our Duty to take this Opportunity of representing to Your Lordship and to Mr. Mansfield, that, if the Payments to be made for Medical Expences up to the 18th February last, shall exceed the amount of the Stock purchased from the Privy Purse, it will be impossible for us to provide from any Means actually at our Disposal for the Deficit; the Payments which we have been under the necessity of making on Account of His Majesty having reduced the Sums in the hands of Mess^{rs} Drummonds which were at

Our

Our Disposal to about £5,000 while
 the Claims on His Majesty's Private
 Property & Revenue which still remain
 to be liquidated amount to at least
 £20,000. — Thus the Deficit in the
 Means of discharging the existing
 Claims exclusively of any Medical
 Charges is £15,000 and in this Calcula-
 tion We have not adverted to the
 Possibility of having to meet further
 Demands not yet produced.

We shall be ready to submit
 the Particulars of these Payments and
 Claims to Her Majesty and The Prince
 Regent whenever They shall honor
 us with Their Commands to that
 Effect, in conformity to the Act of this
 Session.

The Proportion of the £70,000
 issued to the Keeper of the Privy Purse
 for the residue of the April Quarter
 and the whole of the July Quarter is

about £26,000, out of which, about, £13,000
is reserved for the Annual and Quarterly
Payments to be made by the Keeper of

which the Undersigned, Trustees of His
Majesty's Real and Personal Estate,
had the Honor of submitting to Her
Majesty and The Prince Regent on the
13th May 1866, They stated that the
Concerns of the Trust committed to
Their Charge had been brought within
a very narrow Compass and divested
of the Difficulties which attached to
the early management of them, and
They are now enabled to repeat this
Statement, as their Duties gradually
assume a more simple form, and
are

are in great measure confined to the
Settlement of Accounts of which they will
respectfully endeavour to submit as
clear and concise an Abstract as the
various nature of them will admit,
And the general Result will be shewn

The Expenditure has also been increased by the Transfer made from the Windsor Establishment to the King's Privy Purse, under the Authority of the Treasury, of various Payments heretofore made on Account of the Windsor Establishment, such as Compensation to the King's Band of Musicians in lieu of Clothing, to the amount of about £370. per Annum; And Payments for the Establishment at Weymouth to the Amount of nearly £450 per Annum.

The Accumulation of these must naturally tend to reduce the Amount of Surplus Balance receivable on

them

this Branch of the Disbursements but
this reduction will be amply compensated
by the Diminution in the General Ex-
penditure and by the progressively increas-
