

Memorandum of General Proceedings of the
 (late) King's Trustees in reference to the Care and
 Management of His Majesty's Real & Personal
 Estate, and the Receipts & Payments of His
 Majesty's Privy Purse: — Between the Period of
 their Nomination to that Trust and the 5th of
 January 1820.

The Appointment of the (late)
 King's Trustees took place by Sign Manual
 Warrant of the late Queen & the Prince
 Regent on the 29th February 1812 and they
 took the Oath prescribed by the Act of
 Parliament on the 2^d of March following —

Previously to their Appointment
 Mr. A. B. Drummond as Keeper of the
 Privy Purse had paid out of the Monies
 which had accumulated between the
 commencement of the King's Illness &
 the passing of the Household Act various
 Charges and the Medical Expenses to a
 large amount, and it will be found by
 reference to his Account that the Payments

on account of Medical Attendance in the
Year ending 5th Jan^r 1813 were £75,537. 12. 10
which appears to have included the Charges
from the first date of the King's Illness.

It will appear from reference
to the Trustees' General Account with Mess^{rs}
Drummonds which is annexed, that the
Balance which was transferred by them
from the King's Private Account to that of
His Majesty's Trustees in March 1812 was
£37,000 in Exchequer Bills and
191. 18. 5 in Cash.

The Bills & other Payments in
Arrear which they then discharged amounted
to £34,076. 19. 2½ and there remained
due to Mr. Villiers £5,558. 15. 6 which
were paid at two subsequent periods
(in 1815 & 16) to the Navy Board, under
the extent issued against His Property.

The Balance in hand therefore,
after discharging the Demands in Arrear,
was £3,114. 19. 2½ to which should be
added the Interest receivable on the

Exchequer

Exchequer Bills £1,367. 15. 3 as shown in
the Account A & B. making the total Balance
£4,482. 14. 5/2. and there remained a
debt of £5,538. 15. 6 unprovided for.

For the Annual Receipts of the
King's Privy Purse, reference must be had
to Mr A. B. Drummond who, under the
Act 52. George 3^d was made responsible,
to the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury
for his Receipts & Expenditure

The late Mr Brown & Mr Bot
as Paymasters of Private Pensions were,
under the same Act, equally made account-
=able to the Lords Commissioners of the
Treasury, but Sir Herbert Taylor, having
been authorized by their Lordships to
audit these Accounts from and after
the Year ending 5th Jan^r 1821. is enabled to
state that, out of the General Receipts,
the Keeper of the Privy Purse has, between
that date & the 5th Jan^r 1820, issued the
sums which are stated in the General
Abstract annexed C. Article, No. 1. — the
Quarterly Payments of £4,970 under the

late Queen's & The Duke of York's Warrants
being to provide for Private Pensions, Salaries,
Allowances, Bills & other Contingencies, the
whole amount of which * between the 5th
Jan^o 1792 and the 5th Jan^o 1820 is also
shewn in the Paper C. No 2. —

£ 1,115,464. 2. 4.

The Surplus on these Payments
has been progressively transferred to the
King's Trustees as has also the surplus
on Mr A. B. Drummond's Payments,
in conformity to the Provisions of the Act
before quoted, and the progressive total
Amounts of both are shewn in Enclosure
C. No 3. —

The whole of this Surplus has,
been paid from time to time, as received,
into the hands of Mess^{rs} Drummonds, His
Majesty's Bankers, as have also the
Monies paid to the King's Trustees for
Rents & Sundries, the Produce of Farming
Stock sold by Auction, of the Balances on
the Home Park Account, & of the Produce,
of Sales of Property under the Windsor
Forest Enclosure Act, the total amount of
which under their several heads are stated

in the Enclosure C. No. 4. —

These sums have been, as received, progressively vested in the Funds, with the usual Reserve of an Annual Balance of from £3000 to 4000 left in the hands of Messrs Drummonds to meet current demands.

The progressive state of the Balances in favor of His Majesty's General Account at Messrs Drummonds is also shown in Enclosure C. No. 5. and it will appear that the Excess in the Actual Balance, beyond the simple Receipts from the Keeper of the Privy Purse and Messrs Brawn and Boff, has arisen from sales of Property &c and accumulation of Interests on the sums progressively vested. —

Independently of the arrears discharged early in 1852, the chief Payments made by the Drafts of His Majesty's Trustees have been for Repair of Buildings, as stated in the Enclosure C. No. 6.

The greater Proportion of this Charge was however until March 1859, included in the Payments of Messrs Brawn and Boff (See Enclosure C. No. 7) but since

the

the Additions made to the Pensions, they
have been met partly by the Drafts of
His Majesty's Trustees.

The Pensions, Salaries & Allowances
form the principal Item in the Payments
of Messrs Brawn & Bott, & the amount of
this Item is stated in Enclosure C. No. 8.
as is also that of the Payments under the
general head of Bills & Contingencies
which with the Repair of Buildings will
be found to produce the total given in a
previous part of this Statement * £1165,464. 2. 1/2

The original Amount of Salaries,
Pensions & Allowances, the Increase made
to them by the late Queen & the further
additions under the Duke of York's Warrants,
in conformity to the Act of 6th April 59 Geo. 3
are also shown in the Enclosure C. No. 9.

The Contingent Expenses of the
Office of His Majesty's Trustees as stated
in the Enclosure C. No. 10 including the pay
of Secretary and Clerk, have not on the average,
exceeded £500 per Annum.

Altho' as before stated the General Account of the Keeper of the Privy Purse do not come under the Cognizance of the King's Trustees, it may not be improper to observe that the Extra Bills for the King's Library have been paid by Mr. A. B. Drummond under the sanction of their Certificate, & have amounted to the sums specified in Enclosure C. No 11. - , to which should be added the sums paid on the same account by their Drafts as stated under the same Article.

And it may not be superfluous to add that the total Amount of Medical Expenses paid by the Keeper of the Privy Purse (including the £75,537. 12. 10 stated to have been incurred to the Year ending 5th Jan^r 1813) up to 5th Jan^r 1820 has been £271,691. 18. 0 as shewn in Enclosure C. No 12. -

Finally it will appear by the Account with Mess^{rs} Drummond & A. B. already referred to that their total Receipts & Payments on Account of His Majesty's Trustees, and the Actual Amount of Stock,

and Cash Balance are stated in Enclosure,
C. No. 13. —

It has been stated that the
Balance beyond the surplus Receipts
from the Privy Purse, has arisen partly
from Sales of Property; But latterly it has
been almost wholly confined to those surplus
Payments and to the Dividends on Stock,
as there remained little Property to be
realized under the Windsor Forest Enclosure
Act, as the Sale of Farming Stock, to a
large amount took place only at the period
of the Transfer of the Property held "in Fee Simple",
to the Regent, and as the Monies issued to
Mr. Bott, from which a surplus had been
occasionally received, do not now cover his
Disbursements, these having been increased
by the additional Pension granted under
the Act of the 6th April 59th George 3^d;
towards which therefore, it has been agreed
with the Treasury, that the keeper of the
Privy Purse shall contribute by occasional
Extra Payments to Mr. Bott.

Besides the Account already

referred

referred to in this memorandum there are annexed to it, General Statements describing His Majesty's Real and His Personal Property. D. and E.

In reference to the previous Article respecting the Extra Library Bills (See Enclosure C. No. 11) it should be stated that, in consequence of the Command of the late Queen and the Prince Regent, the King's valuable Library has, from the first Commencement of the Trust, been the object of the particular Attention of His Majesty's Trustees, & as the general Accumulations within late Years of interesting & expensive Publications of which the Acquisition was considered indispensable towards the Completion of this Collection would necessarily occasion Disbursements much exceeding the Annual Sums previously applied to this Use, they obtained the Sanction of the Lord Commissioners of the Treasury, to whom the Keeper of the Privy Purse was accountable, for the latter's paying any Extra Bills produced by His Majesty's Librarian, Mr. Barnard which

They should certify

They were also honoured with the same Commands & obtained the same sanction for printing the Catalogue of the Library which is actually in progress. —

This will account for the charge under those heads to the amount of £ 8830. 17. 6 in the Account of the Keeper of the Privy Purse, & it should be observed that other Bills received in 1819 to the Amount of £ 1136. 7. 0 have been certified but not yet paid, & that there is reason to believe that there are other Bills in arrear on the same Account not yet produced by Mr. Barnard besides the progressive expenditure on the Catalogue which may not yet be completed for some Years, & which was, when first sanctioned, estimated at nearly £ 5,000.

There remain also to be discharged various Current Accounts such as those of Messrs. Hill, Strong and Packham, and of Messrs. Secker, His Majesty's Solicitors in London & Windsor, — those for

Works at New St. &c. — but the Cash Balance
 at Mess^{rs} Drummonds, the Surplus
 Balance on the Privy Purse Account &
 the Produce of the live and dead Stock
 in the Home Park (if it should be
 disposed of) would more than cover
 the whole of these Charges, without resorting
 to the Sale of any part of the forfeited
 Property. —

Besides the Notes attached to the List, I venture most humbly to solicit His Majesty's gracious attention more particularly to the Case of Mr Smart, whose Claim to a Public Pension has not been admitted, in spite of repeated applications to the Treasury urged in the strongest manner - He has no other Provision and is under all Circumstances an object of His Majesty's Bounty.

the Condition of the Stock would render it more
advantageous. In the mean time I have been
directed to continue the Management as heretofore,
and the only Alterations I have made are, to

There are three Alternatives.

The next is to take in his Stock of all descriptions of Exports, but the Return from this would

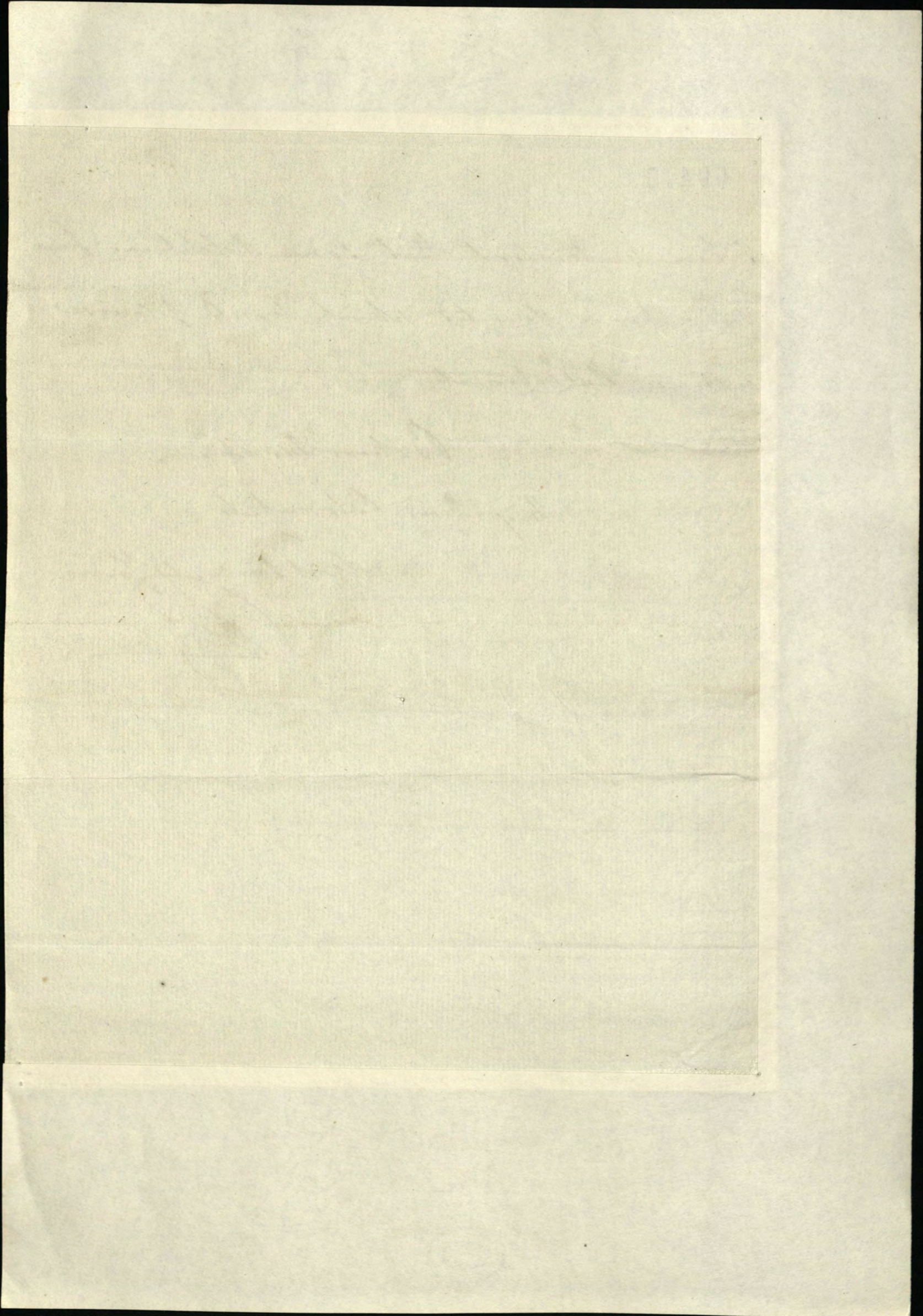
