We William August, by the Grace of God,  
Duke of Cumberland and of Branswic-Luneburg,  
make known & confess by these presents :  
Whereas it has pleased the most Serene and  
most mighty Prince George II. by the Grace  
of God, King of Great-Britain, France &  
Ireland, Defender of the Faith, Duke of Branswic  
Luneburg, Arch-Treasurer & Elector of the holy  
Roman Empire, Our most gracious Father,  
to augment the Fund, established already  
before, out of paternal affection, as Our  
Appanagium & future Maintenance, with a  
Sum of eleven hundred thousand Rix-dollars,  
and to do this to day by an Act of Cession, delivered  
to us, and which is Word for Word as followeth :

We George II. by the Grace of God, King  
of Great-Britain, France & Ireland,

Defender of the Faith, Duke of Bruns-  
wick-Luneburg, Arch-Treasurer & Elector of  
the holy Roman Empire, Whereas  
We have expressly reserved to Us in Our  
Codicil, made at Hannover the 17<sup>th</sup> Day of  
October 1740. to augment what We had  
left and bequeathed therein, as well as in  
Our preceding Testament, bearing Date:  
Herrenhausen August the 25<sup>th</sup> 1732. on  
Our second Son William August, Duke  
of Cumberland, and of Brunswick-Luneburg,  
for an Appanagium, & for His future  
suitable Maintenance; and whereas  
We have for that purpose set out and  
intended a Sum of eleven hundred  
thousand Pounds Dollars: That We declare,  
attest, and confirm this Our said Will  
and

and Intention to be: that with the  
above mentioned eleven hundred thousand  
Prix dollars, which for that purpose we  
have remitted to Hannover, the sum  
intended & established for the Annuity-  
guim & future suitable Subsistence  
of Our said second Son William August,  
shall be augmented, and the said sum  
be incorporated into it, and be in every  
respect of the same Nature and Quality  
as the 110,8091. Prix dollars 31 Gros 1 Flor.  
named in Our above mentioned Codicil,  
and as the immoveables to be purchased  
therewith: And as with respect to the  
just now mentioned 110,8091. Prix dollars  
31 Gros 1 Flor, We have made on the  
10<sup>th</sup> Day of June 1743. a particular act

of Cession and Transfer, to that effect,  
that We might the more be assured of the  
fullfilling of Our most gracious Intention,  
in conformity of which the Fund intended  
for an Appanagium, and the future Main-  
tenance for Our said Son, is, at the time  
of Our Demise, to be ipso jure His, without  
Difficulty and Hindrance; So We do now  
the same, with respect to these 1100000.  
Pounds Dollars, which We add to that Fund,  
and We transfer and cede them to Our  
said Son in the same manner and with  
the same Intention, and We ordain,  
that at Our Death the said 1100000.  
Pounds Dollars shall become the Property  
of Our said Son, in the same manner,  
as Our above mention'd Codicil of

the 13<sup>th</sup> October 1740. with respect to  
that thereon mentioned Capital of £108091.  
Pounds. 31 Gros. 1 Stuv. Dicnts, and that  
they shall have, the nature of a Fidei  
Commisum, in the like manner, as  
the Capitals, specified in Our Testament  
and as it has likewise been prescribed  
in the said Testament and Codicil, was  
to be transmitted, if the Cases happen,  
to the next Heir. The Interest and  
Revenues however shall remain, as long,  
as God shall grant Us life, to Our free  
Disposition, and shall be accounted for  
to Us.

Wherefore Our said Son has not only  
acknowledged by His Reversales, given  
under this date, and delivered to Us, this

Our reserving to Us the Fruition of those  
Interest & Revenues; But We further  
expressly declare herewith, that is  
not Our Intention, to prejudice in the  
least by this Cession Our above mention'd  
Codicil, and the two Testaments mention'd  
therein, or to change, or to make any  
alteration in them.

In Witness of which, We have  
signed with Our own Hand this act  
of Cession, and caused Our Royal &  
Electoral Seal to be set to it. Transacted  
at Our Palace at St James <sup>March 28.</sup>  
<sub>April 8.</sub>  
1745. of Our Reign the eighteenth

That We therefore accept this most gracious  
Cession in the manner it has been inserted  
here

here, with the deepest filial Duty & Gratitude,  
and that during the lifetime of Our Fathers  
Majesty, which God may prolong, We not only  
will not form from thence any Pretension to  
the Interest, & Profits, arising from the said  
Capital of 1100000 Pounds Dollars, nor pretend  
to any Disposition thereof: But that We also  
freely submit to whatever His Majesty has  
in one or the other Way already disposed,  
with respect to the said Sum, or may for the  
future think fit to dispose and to ordain, and  
that therein We resign Ourselves entirely in  
His Majesty's most gracious Will and Pleasure;  
So all which therefore We engage Us in the  
most binding manner, having signed to  
that Effect these present Powers, and  
caused Our Seal to be set to Them. Translated
