Sir,

I take the liberty to write to your Majesty by General Hervey, to acquaint you that I set out today upon my journey to Hanover, but am to take a little tour to see Harlem and Amsterdam. I did really not indeed, staying so long in Holland, but I have been drawn on little by little. The Prince of Orange, was exceedingly attentive, and obliging; he showed me very particularly his troops; and his Artillery; as to giving your Majesty a true Idea of them, I leave that to G. Harvey, who I am really very sorry to part with, for he is certainly the best Man in the world, and improves upon one amazingly upon acquaintance. I was very much disappointed the other day, when Coll: Cunningham came to Breda, to find that you had been so good as to write to me and that P. George, had taken the letter on to Hanover. I received from the hands of P. Lewis the day I arriv'd, a letter from Brunswick, much civiler than usual, but not mentioning a word of the intended journey.
