a Physician & Surgeon to H. R. H. as soon as it conveniently  
can be done. our opinion is founded on the knowledge  
we have of the insidious Nature of the complaint,  
of the mischief that it sometimes does to the constitution,  
and of its tendency to become a chronical disorder, which,  
without the utmost care, frequently proves fatal  
many months after the first attack. we beg leave farther  
to observe, that in a complaint of this kind, the symptoms  
of which frequently vary, it is impossible to send  
directions that can be of any use at so great a  
distance.
