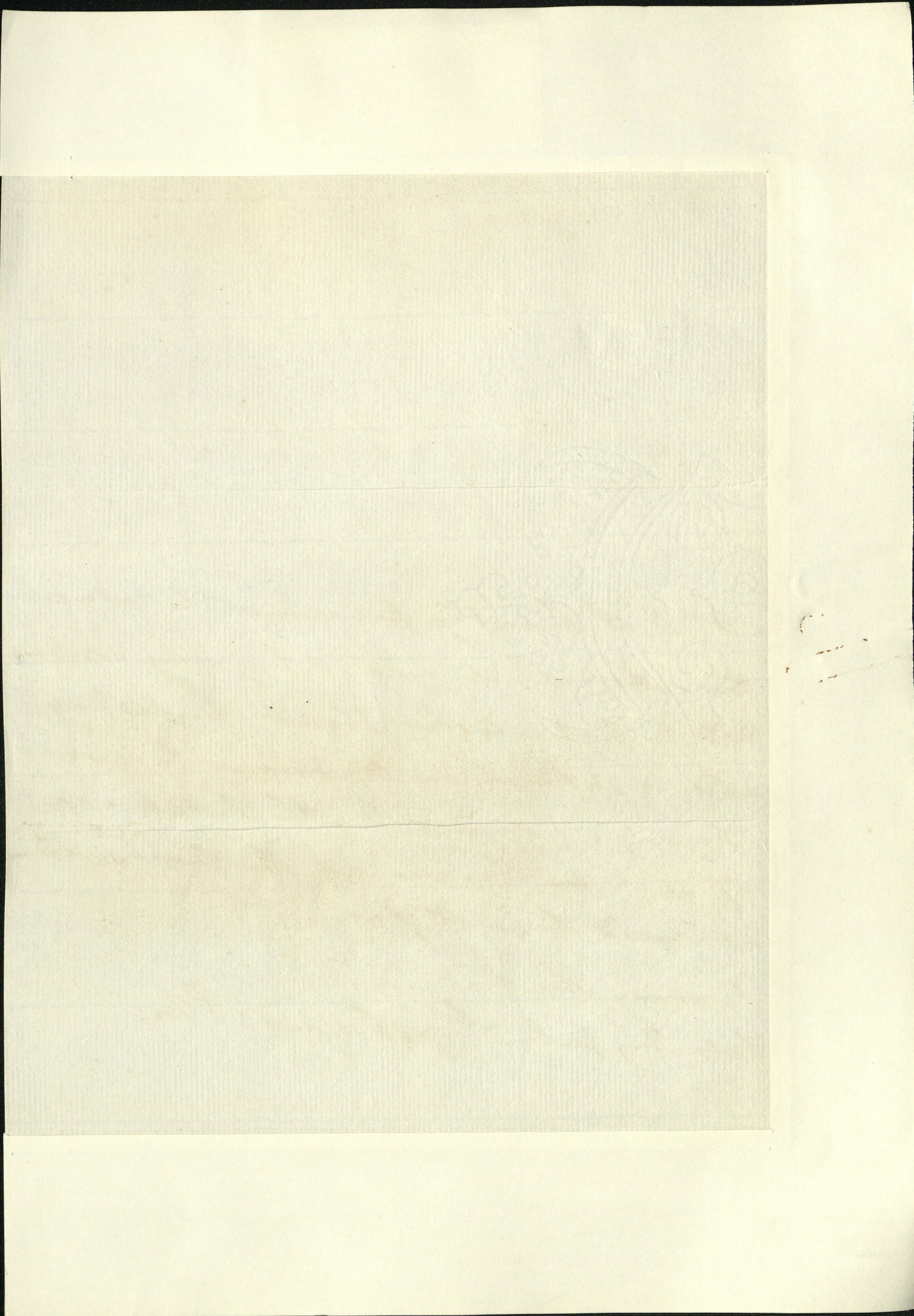

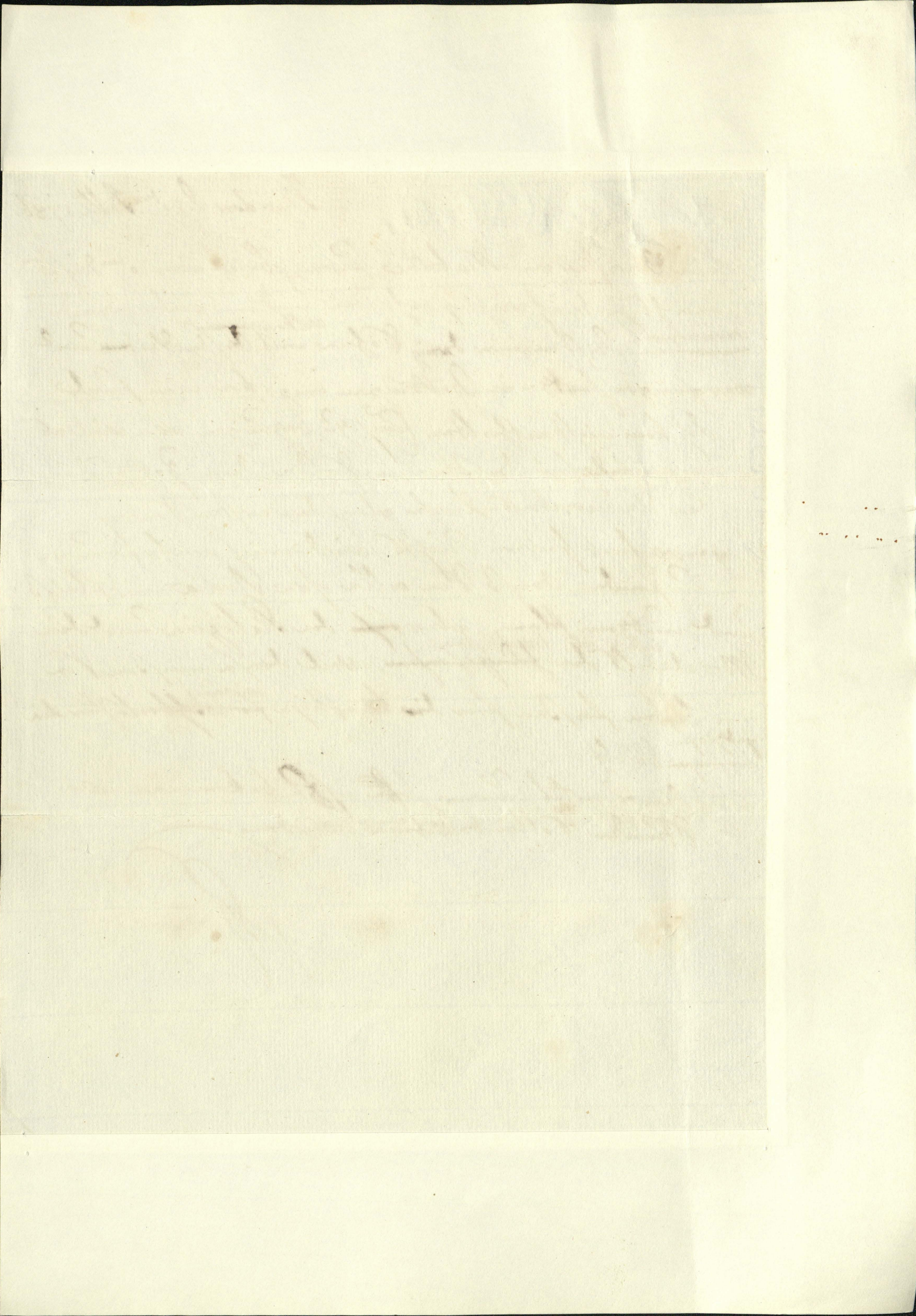

my present situation unavoidably later
than if I had been in doubt as to have



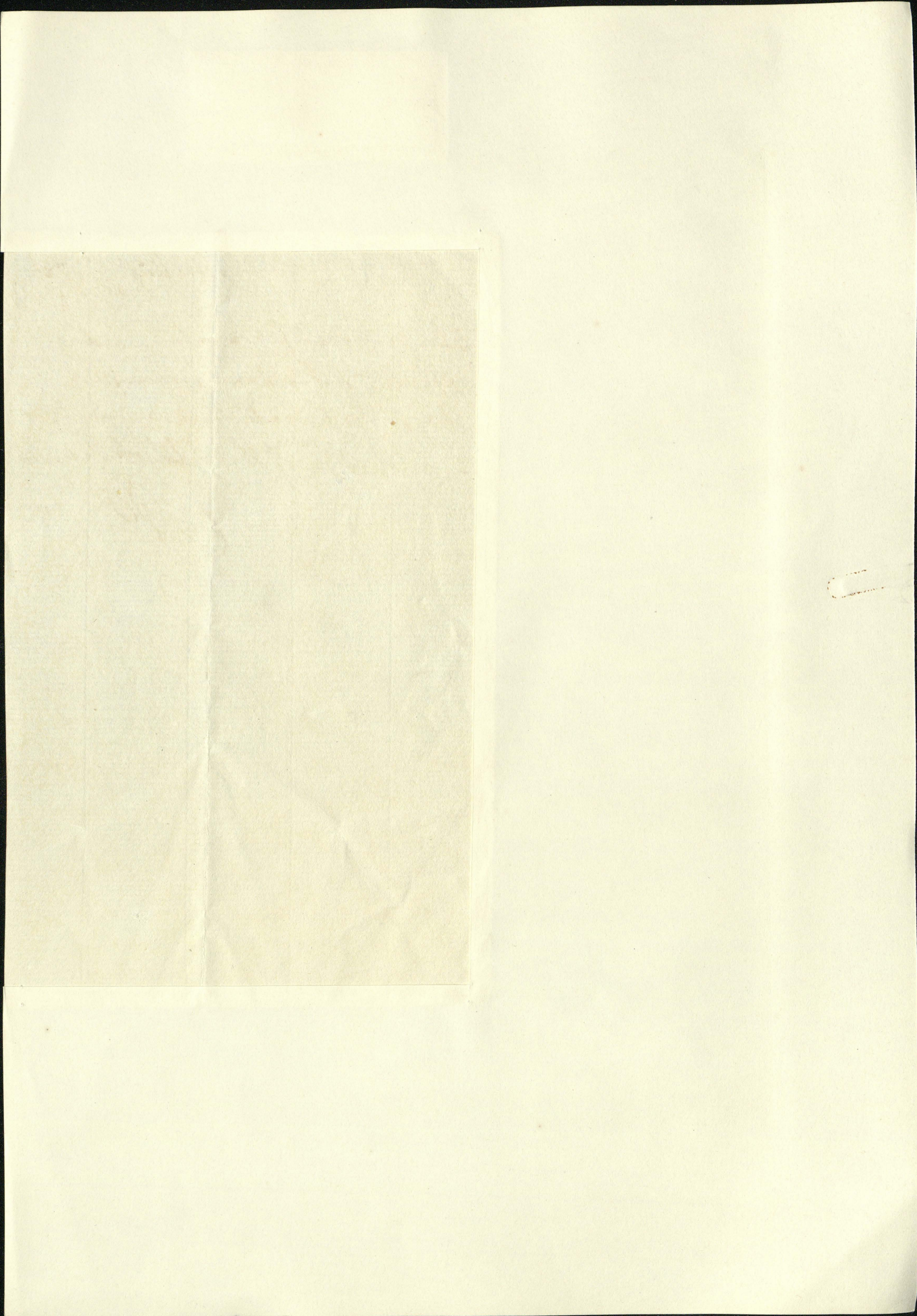
