Sir,

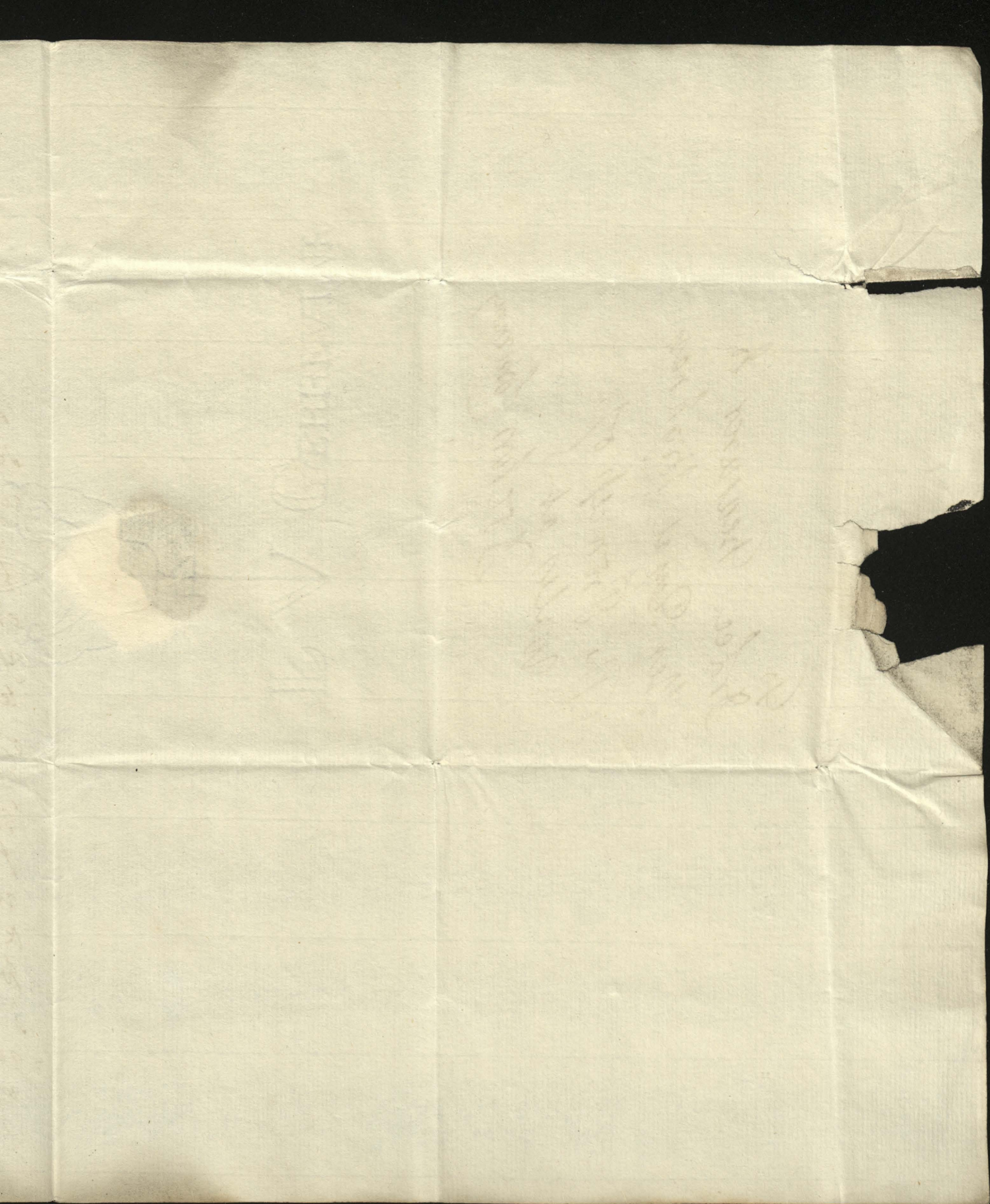
I asked Her M^{ty} about the Person ~~of~~ ^{she} derived; it is
