May it please your Lordships,

In Obedience to an Act of Parliament  
passed in the Tenth Year of His present Majesty's Reign, Intituled  
an Act for Enabling His Majesty to settle a Revenue for  
Supporting the Dignity of Her Most Royall Highness the  
Princess; in Case she shall survive His Royal Highness  
the Prince of Wales and for Exempting such Yearly Sum  
or Sums of Money as His Majesty hath granted, or shall  
grant to His said Royall Highness from the Payment of  
Fees, Taxes, or other Charges whatsoever, and for Enabling  
His said Royall Highness to make Leases of Lands, Parcels  
of the Dutchy of Cornwall, or annexed to the same

I do humbly Certifie to your Lordships  
that there does appear by the Books of Sir Francis Chawilton  
Bar. Receiver General of the Post Office, after the severall  
Articles that he has taken Credit for are paid and Satisfyed  
the Sum of Nine Thousand, four Hundred and Twenty Six  
Pounds, Nineteen Shillings, and One Penny. So that there  
was a Difficiency on the 1<sup>st</sup> Day July 1751. the Sum of Five  
Hundred, seventy three Pounds and Eleven Pence to complete  
the Quarterly Payment of Ten Thousand Pounds due at  
Midsummer last to Her Royall Highness the Princess  
Dowager of Wales. All which is Certified by  
Gen. Post Office  
London July 8<sup>th</sup> 1751.
