For I can not conceal from you my anxiety & concern,
& I have many fears which I shall communicate
by word of mouth. Lady Charlott is here, & I entreated
her assistance yesterday, which she readily
granted to persuade Mr. W. if she was not better to
day to have some Person of note in the Profession
