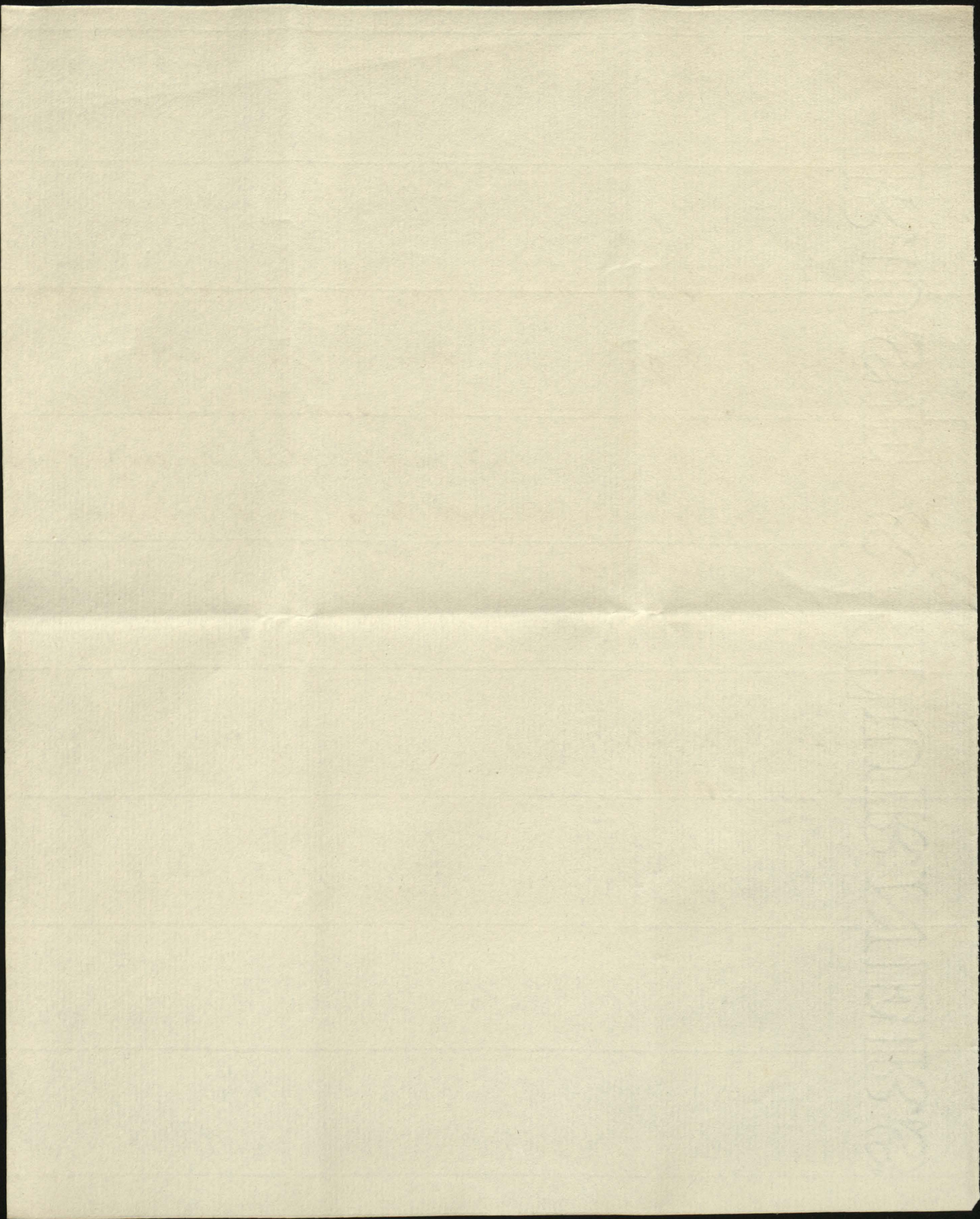

in His chair.

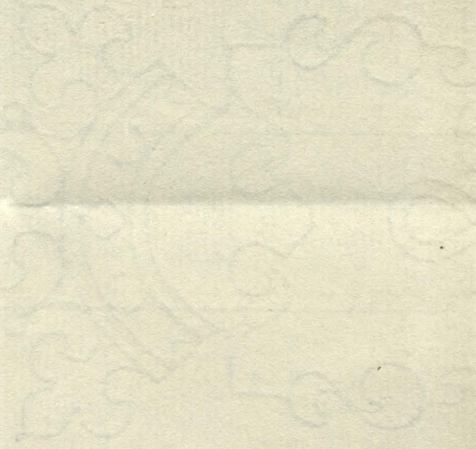

seven hours.

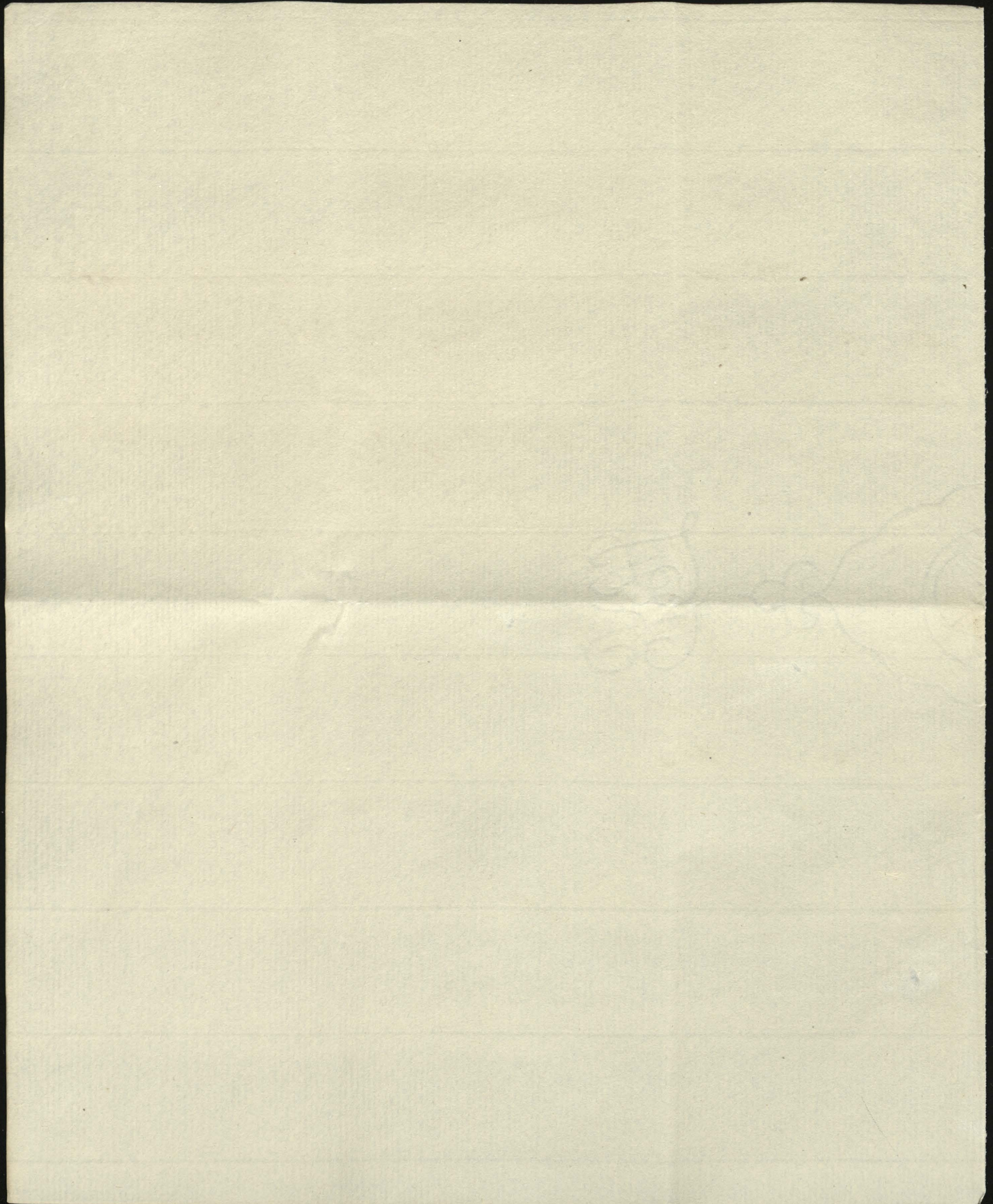

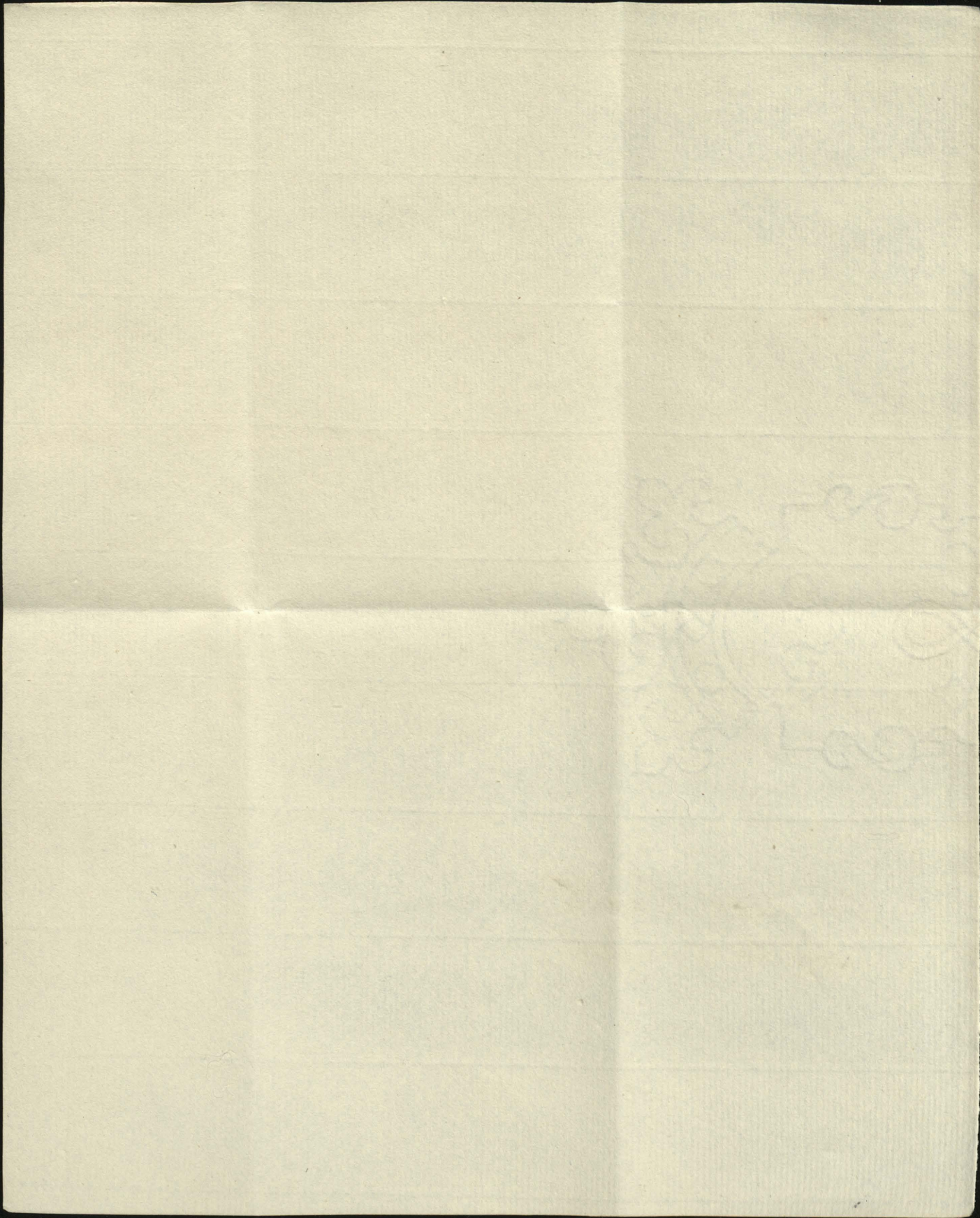

His Majesty slept three hours and a quarter soon after he went to bed, and is pretty well this morning this somewhat invariable.

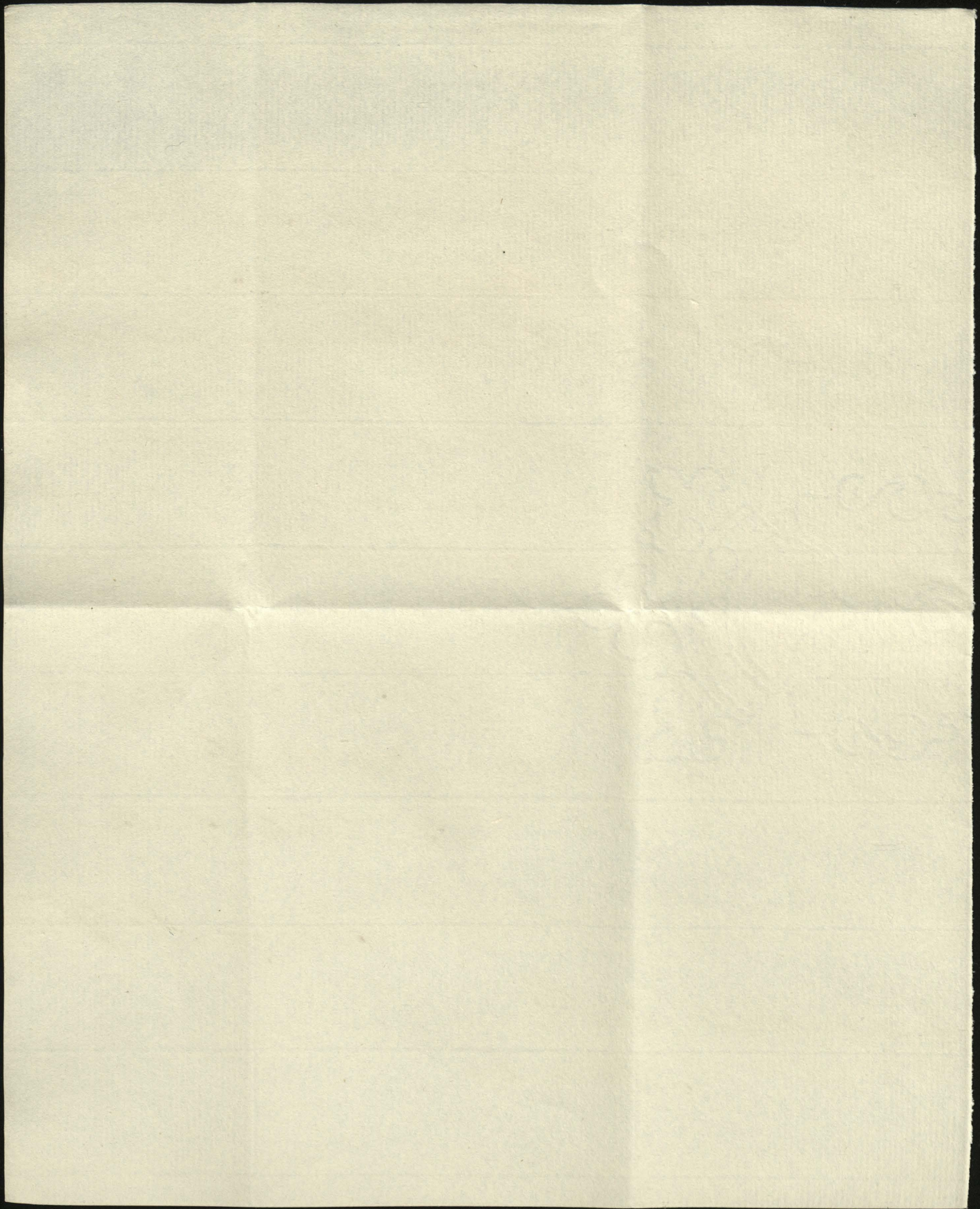
