His Majesty slept two hours and three quarters in the course of yesterday, and the remainder of the day amused himself with cheerful conversation upon the usual topics.

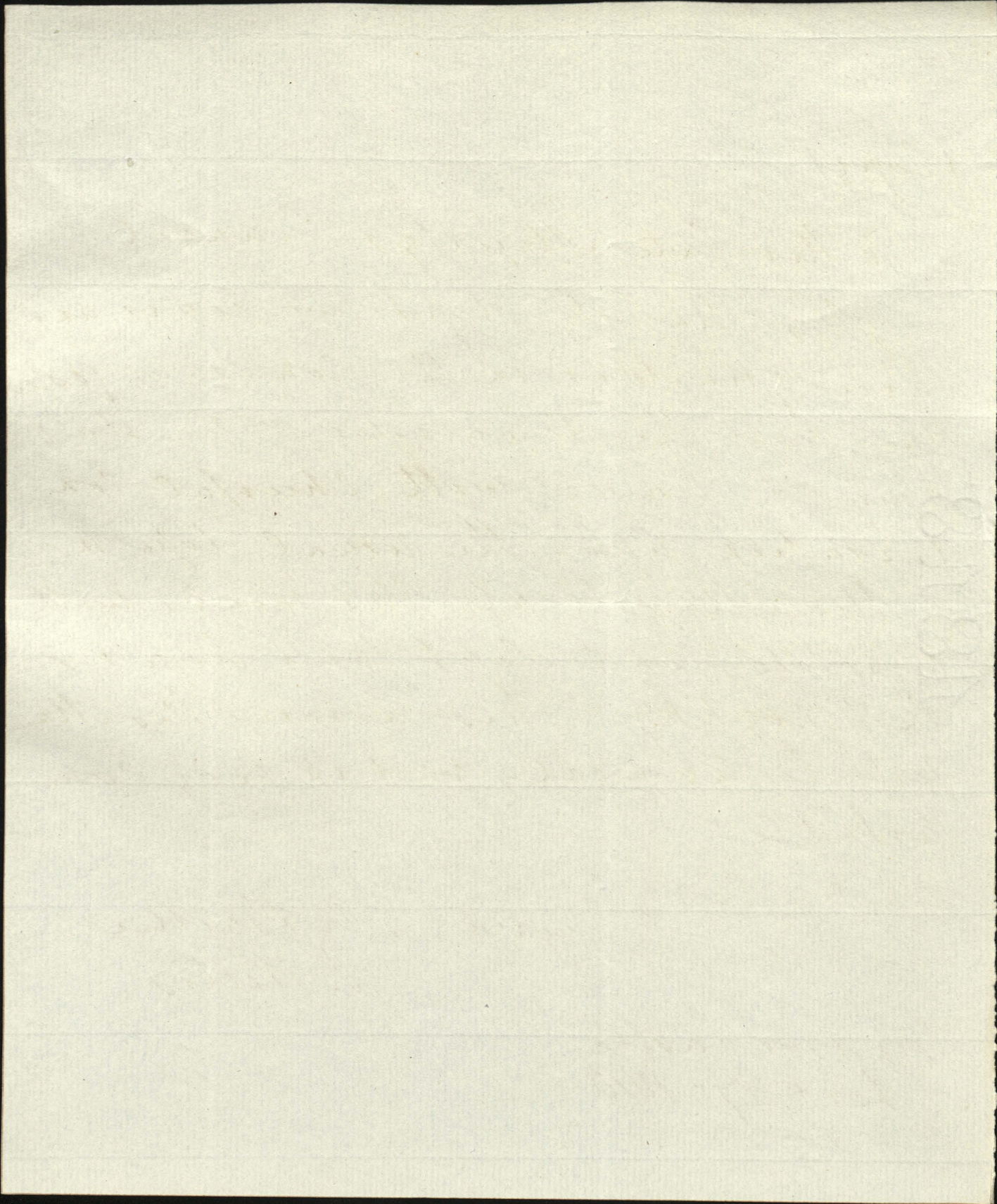
His Majesty ate his meals with appetite, and slept four hours last night — This morning His Majesty looks well, and is very comfortable.

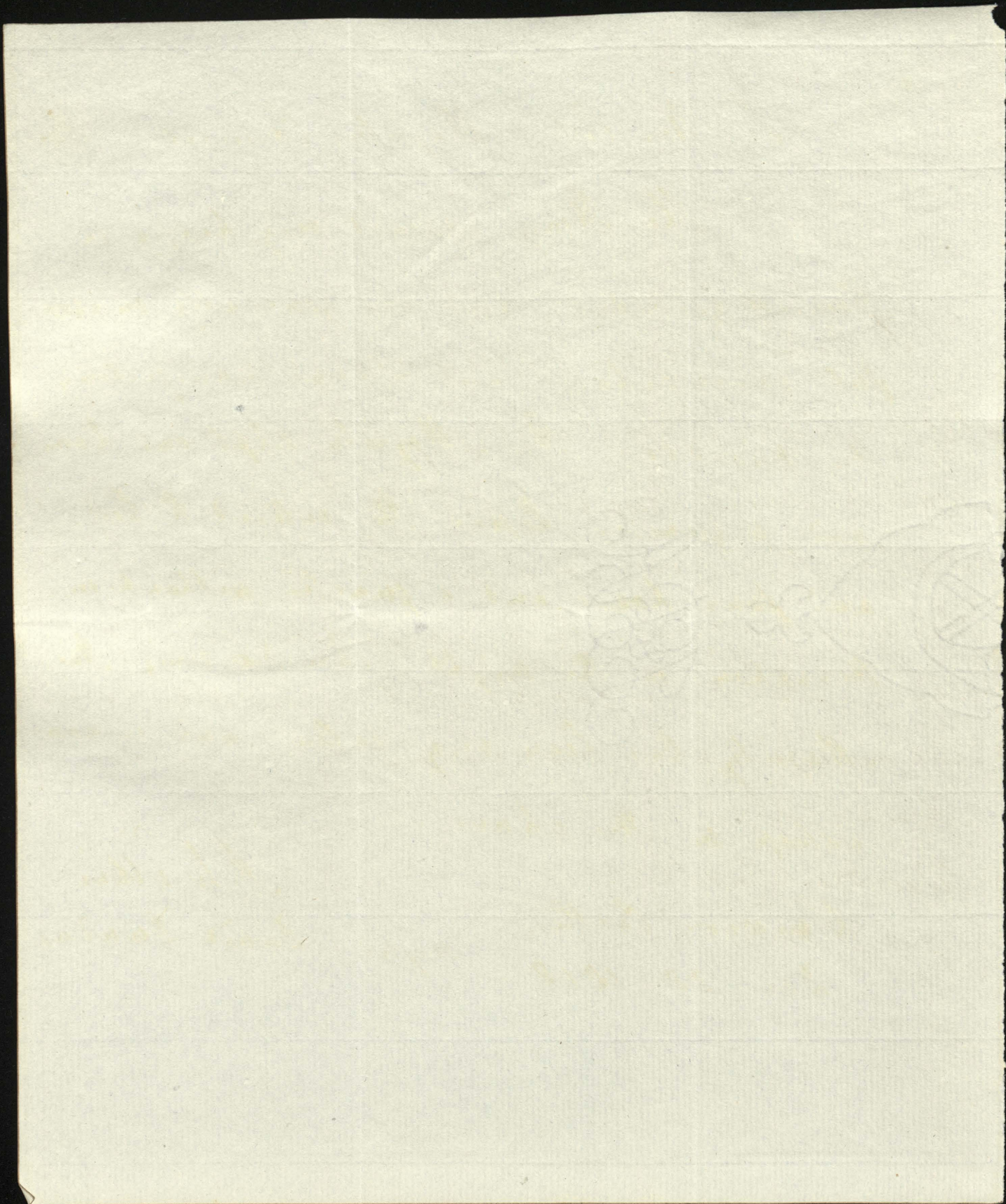

asleep in His chair.

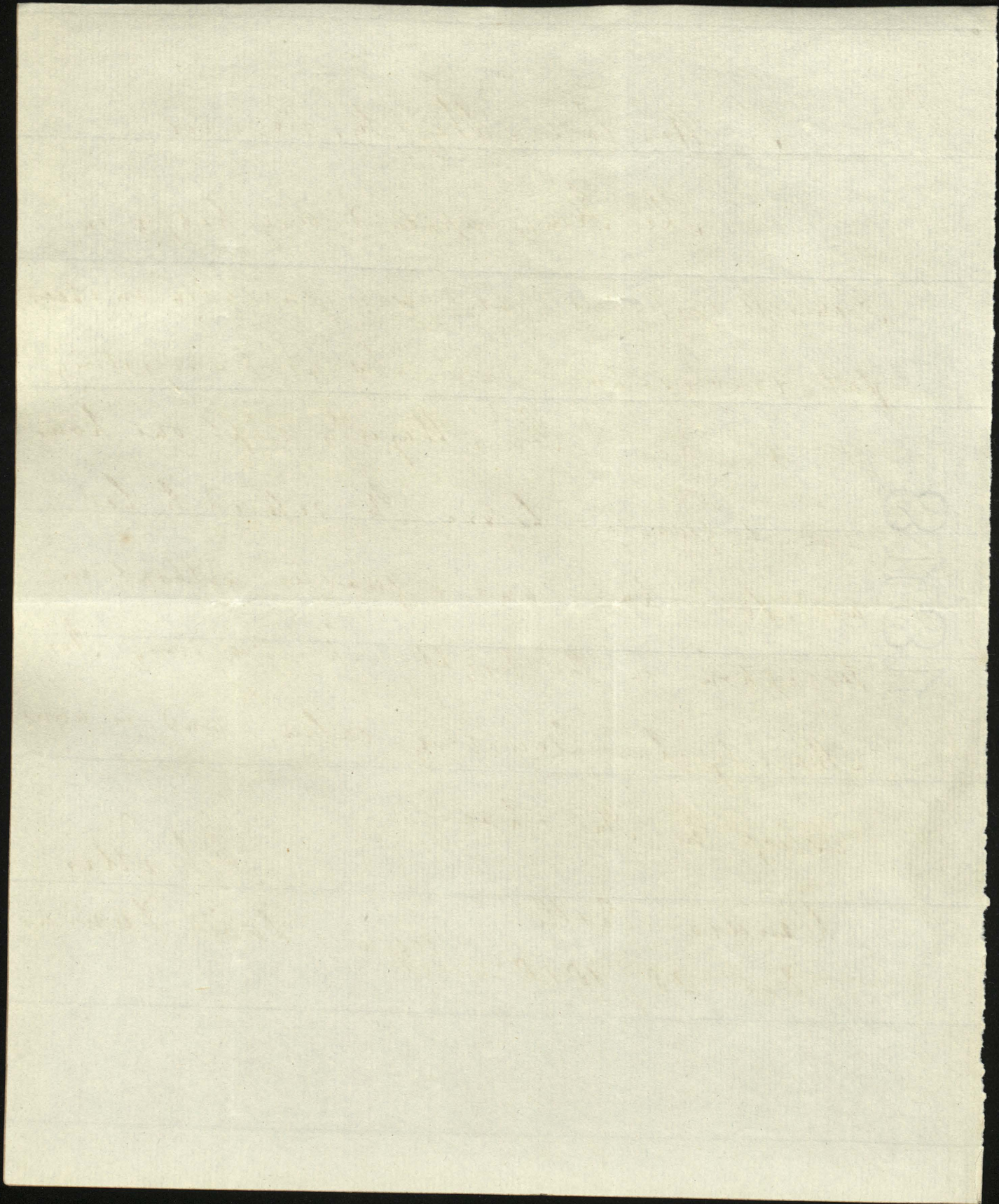

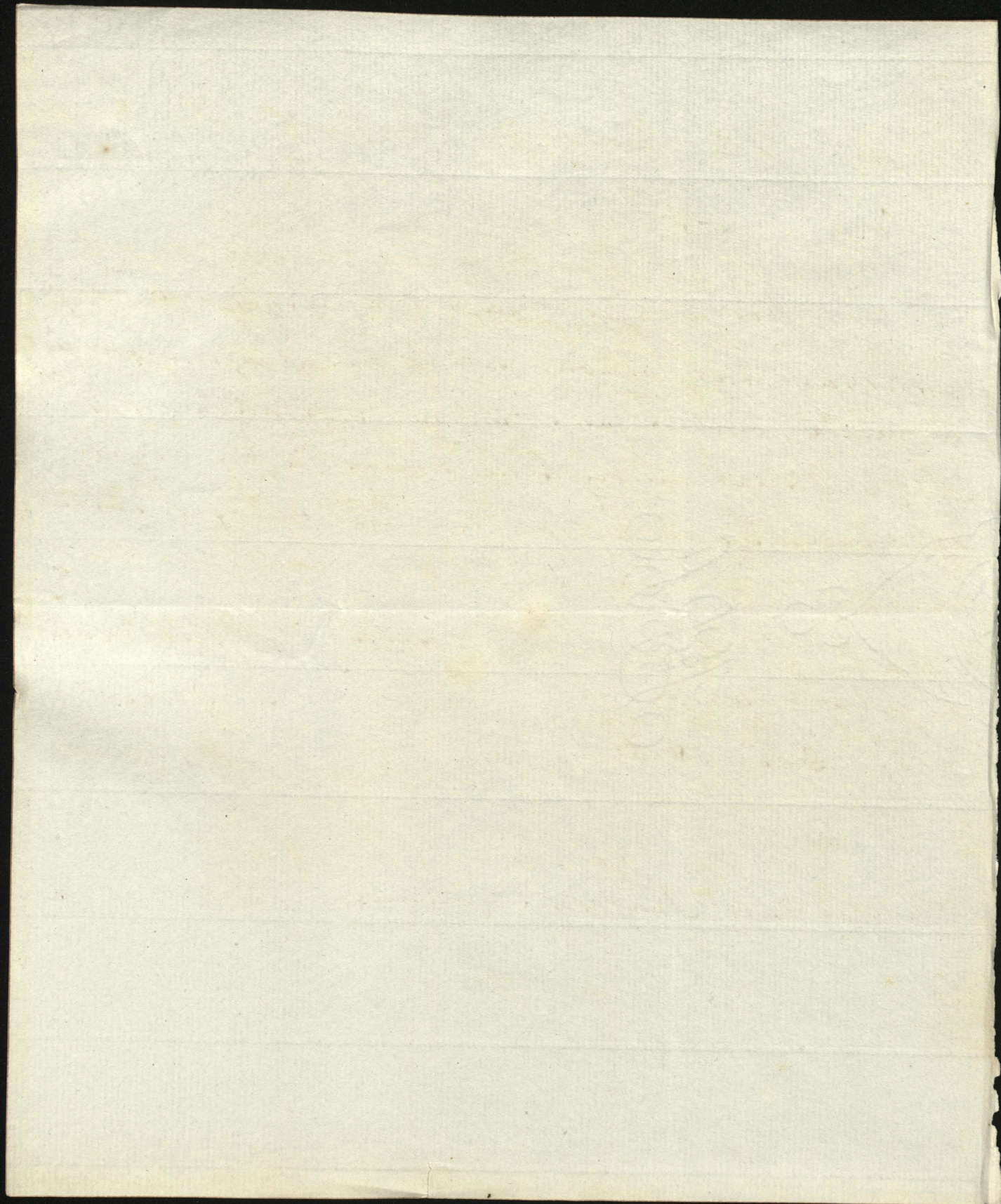
