The attendance on the Committee
of the House of Commons prevented my
doing myself the honour of writing to your
Royal Highness the latter end of last
week, but I told my son to write on Friday,
I came out this morning so early that I
forgot to speak to him about it, Therefore
take the liberty to write from hence to
acquaint your Royal Highness that his
Majesty was much disturbed on Saturday
night, owing I think, as his Majesty
said it was, to his not being permitted

to see the Queen as I had promised his
Majesty he shoud. His Majesty has been
gradually calmer ever since, has been more
sensible of himself & his situation, slept
on Sunday afternoon about an hour &
twenty minutes, three hours on Sunday
night, was calm & undisturbed & well
employ'd most part of yesterday, went
to bed in my presence very calmly &
sensibly a quarter before eleven, & slept
as I was inform'd this morning from a
quarter past eleven last night to a quarter
before eleven this morning, & soon after
waking his Majesty slept very much.

His Majesty's sleep was a natural one
having taken nothing to promote it.

His Majesty complains much of his
eating & sleeping in the same room, & the
great room is too cold for his Majesty to
spend any time in. A large Sharpe's
grate might possibly make the great room
comfortable to sit in, which hint I sent
up to her Majesty last night.




