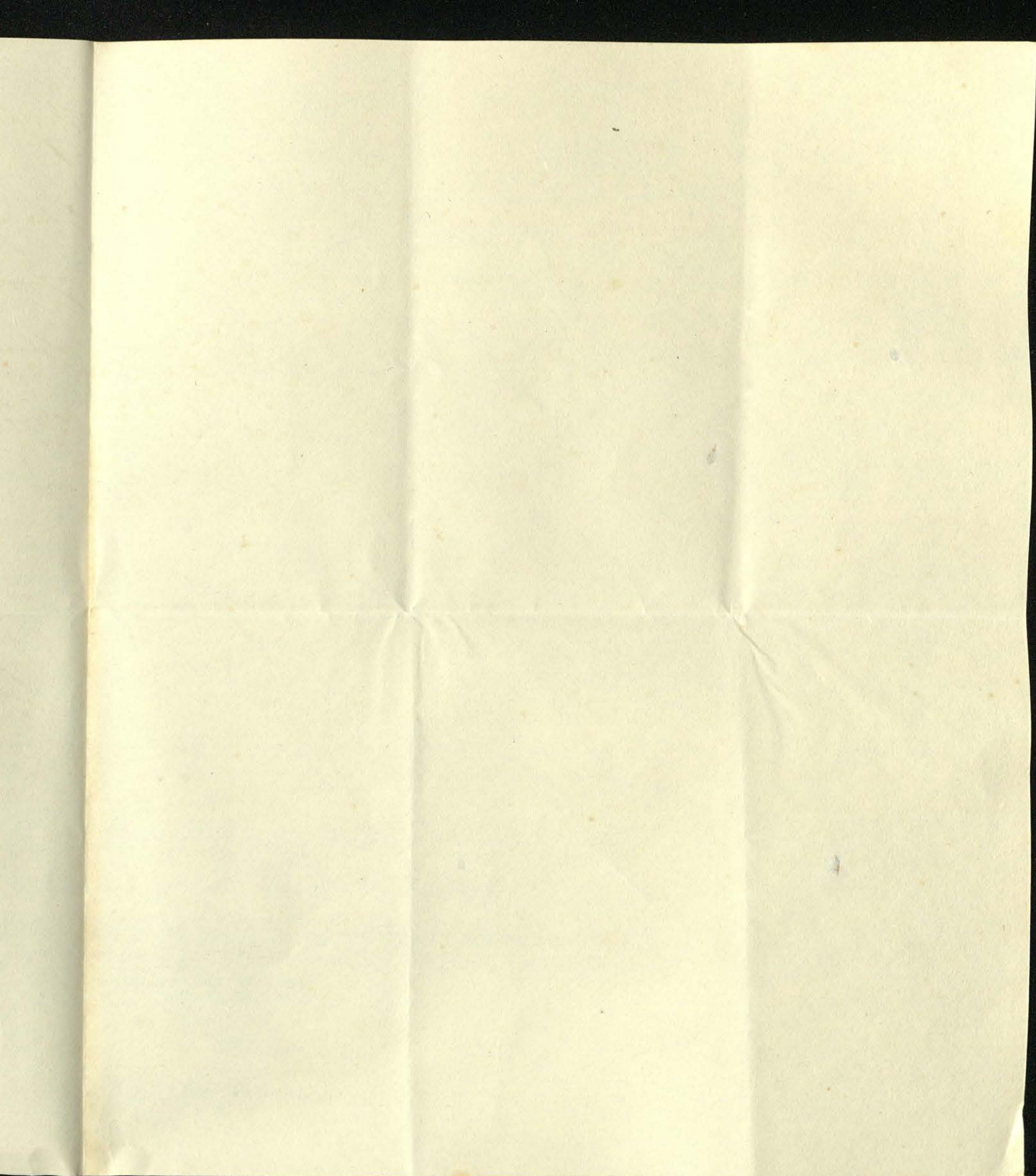

at several reprises in the night.

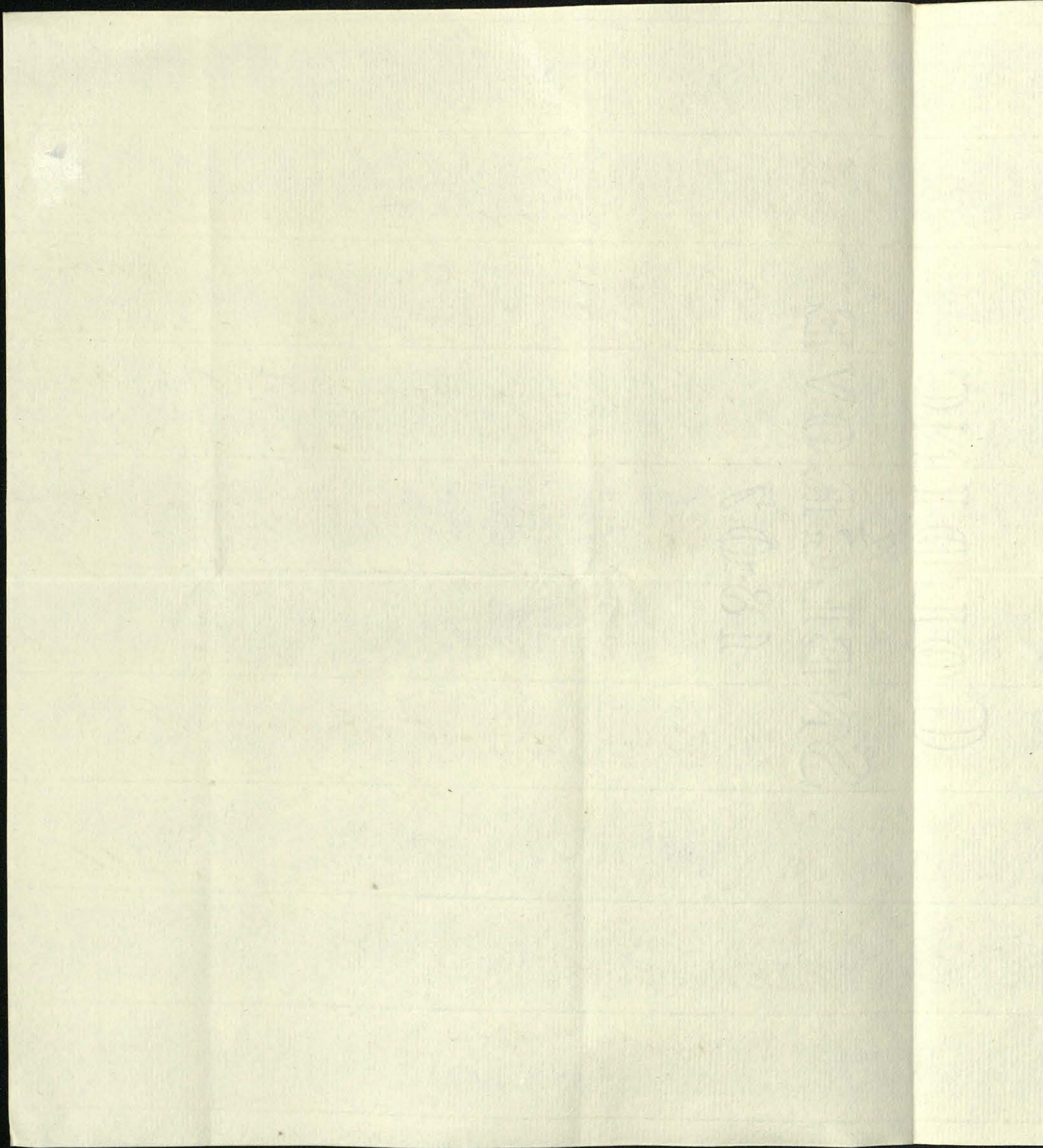
