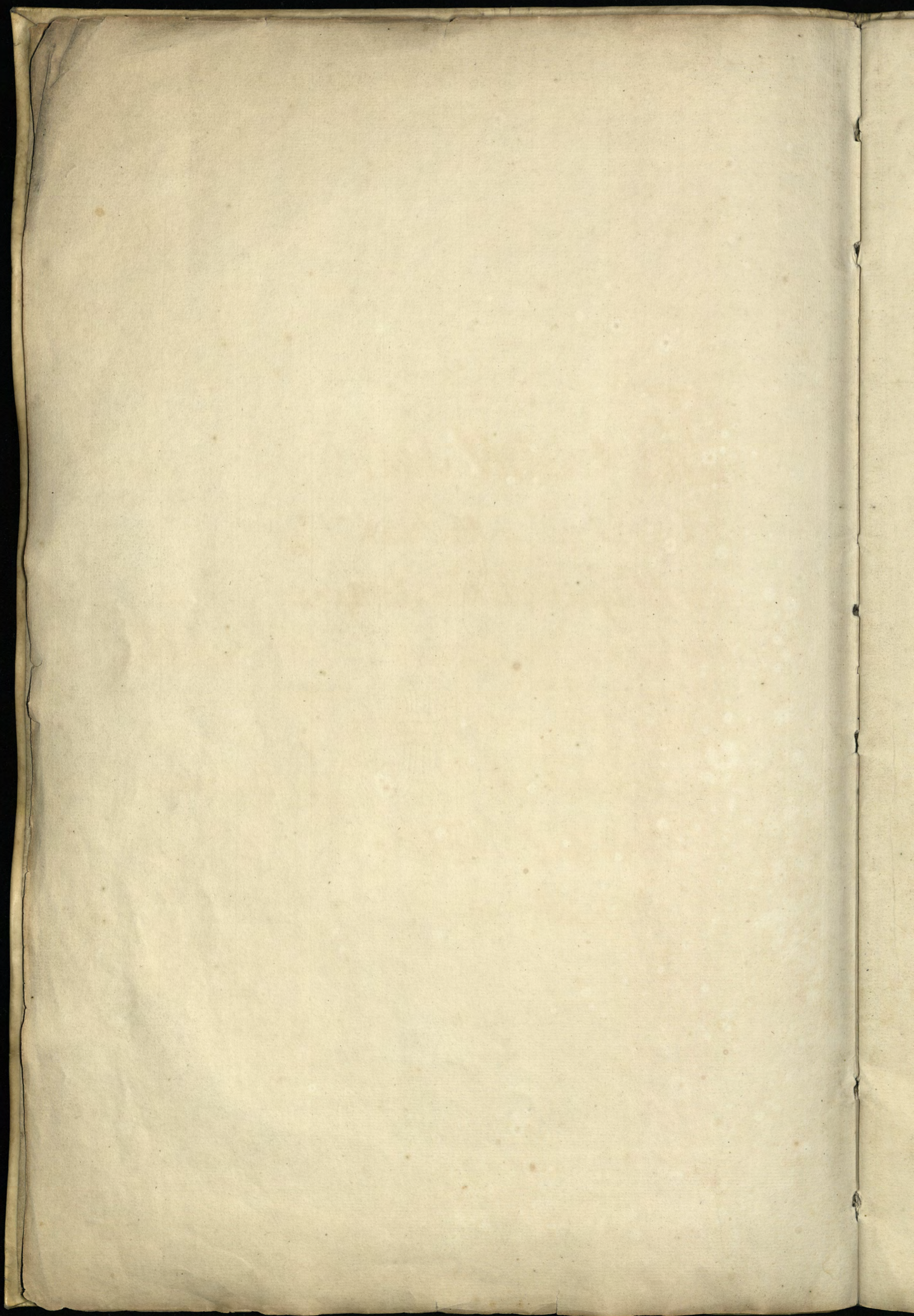

Ordinances to be observed for the Regulating  
Accompts, and for the well Governing of Our House

Our Will and Pleasure is That the Lord Steward, Treasurer, and Comptroller of Our House, and Officers of Our Board of Greencloth, do take care and See This Our Book of Establishment declaring in Particular the Dyetts, Incidentts, Wages, Boardwages, Salaries, Stipends, Pensions, and other Allowances and all the Orders, Articles, and Directions contain'd therein be duly Observed and comply'd with and that the Payments thereof from time to time be regularly made by the Cofferer of Our Household.

And that all other Dyetts, Increases, or Extraordinaries whatsoever which are not Allowed or Warranted by this Book, shall from hence forth cease and be discontinued. And the Clerks of Our Greencloth, and Clerks Comptrollers for the time being shall not Pass, or Allow, nor Our Cofferer Pay any Summ or Summs of Money, but what is directed by this Our Establishment, or shall be approved by Us, or directed by Our especial Command; Neither shall Our Chief Clerk nor any other Clerk of Our Kitchen, Spicery, or of any other Office presume to charge their Records, Books of Remaine or other Books of Accompts, with any Provisions of Meat, Drink, Jewell, Lights or any other Incidentts whatsoever more than is hereby Allowed. But in Case any Command or Warrant shall be procured under Our Signe Manual for any Allowance more than is here Express'd; Our Will and Pleasure is that either Our Lord Steward, Treasurer, Comptroller of Our House, or some other Officer of Our Greencloth doe first acquaint Us with the increase of Our Charge like to grow thereby, before it be put in execution.

And because many Extraordinary Charges may hereafter happen upon the Entertainment of Ambassadors or Strangers, Masques Balls, Plays, or other Special Occasions for Our Honour and Service which being uncertain are not provided for by this Our Book Our Will and Pleasure is, that a Distinct Account of all such Extraordinarys shall be collected and made up Monthly in a Creditor for that purpose by Our Clerks of the Kitchen, Paſſed and Allowed by Our Clerk of the Greencloth and Clerk Comptroller in waiting, that soe it may appear what extraordinary Expences happen in Our House Quarterly.

And at the End of every Quarter, the Officers of Our Greencloth shall present unto Our High Treasurer, or Commissioners of Our Treasury for the time being the Total Summ, of all such Extraordinary Expences as have been made in Our Household in the preceding Quarter, that Money may be Assign'd for the same Accordingly.

And that that the Monys to be Assign'd for Defraying the Expence of Our House may be the better and more usefully applied to Our Service. And for preventing great abuses practised by the Turnbroaches, Scourers and Doorkeepers that serve in Our Own and Household Kitchen Our will and Pleasure is that Noe Turnbroach, Scourer or Doorkeeper be hereafter receiv'd into or Employ'd in either of Our Kitchens aforesaid, but by Certificate under the Hands of Two or more Officers of Our Greencloth, whereof One to be a Clerk of Our Greencloth, And that such Person or Persons be admitted and Enter'd on the standing Roll kept, in Our Accompting house for Registering the Names of Our Household Servants.

And it is Our Will and Pleasure That None be admitted into Our Service, but honest, Able, and fitt Persons, to the end that We may be well serv'd. And for their encouragement, that Succession in all Offices be duly observ'd according to Ancient Custom.
