 acquainted that I wish him to inhabit N^o 4 during his stay
 at Weymouth, which I sincerely hope, may be shortened by poor
 Lady Keble's amendment. He was assured by yesterday's Post
 of my best thanks for their kind attentions to herself & poor
 Amelia.
