 for. Henry Walford assures me he  
 does not find Amelie materially  
 worse, & that he hopes this will  
 be prevented from doing any  
 essential mischief as he finds  
 the Pulse able to bear some degree  
 of lowering which the pain in  
 the chest has a-capt the lungs  
 will make it necessary to have  
 recourse to. He therefore has  
 given her the strong dose this  
 night & will see her to-morrow  
 morning before he leaves which  
 he cannot much be having  
 got this cold as it must be  
 drawn back for some days, but  
 he is pleased to find still so  
 much power of Pulse as it

will make him to act without  
so much fear of offending her  
He will write himself the morning  
he gets to town to Emma -  
Annina appears much cheered  
by Sir Henry's visit, but has  
had a good deal of pain in her  
chest this evening as well  
as today. It is not thought she  
was coughed quite so much  
& after this manner little certainly  
was more comfortable.
