 much the same, but her  
 spirits are better & she appears  
 and she feels stronger —

Mr Dundas also came this  
 evening is of opinion we  
 are not crossing ground &  
 found the Pulse steady —

Amelia desires her most  
 affectionate love & Duty wishes you  
 will excuse her not writing  
 as she does not feel equal  
 to that exertion yet —
