Nov. 11 [1811]

My dearest Brother

There has been a
 perfect quiet & silent composed
 day. The King has eat his
 dinner well, went to bed
 at six o'clock & sleep'd well
 at 9 - but Battant came to day
 & returned to Dover the very
 moment after he left the L
 The Queen told me that she
 perfectly understood her
 that her object was to have
 it clearly made out her
 Daughters were not to
