Sept. 5 1798

How can I ever thank you enough My dearest dear  
Brother for your kind perfect and most P. letter  
I received this morning many many thanks  
for it and for the very comfortable account you  
give of our dear Amulet, it is by far the  
best we have had yet & I own the only one  
that has made me feel happy about her.  
Knee, as I am quite sure nothing would  
have made you write such an account  
without you really found her as much  
improved as she is — the account & very  
like picture you send me of Gouilly delighted  
me much as for her being grown fat  
I am not surprised at, as she promised  
when I saw her last to be very large  
indeed in time, Anna laughed at  
all the nonsense contained in  
your letter to me & was not a little  
pleas'd with the charming account of  
Amulet — We all arrived safe at this  
Place Saturday evening after a very long  
& warm journey down, much a heat.  
I never felt in all my life before, when

notwithstanding all the fatigue I have  
 not suffered in any respect whatsoever  
 from the journey, and I think I have  
 not seen her for years so well as she is  
 now both as to looks & spirits so perfectly  
 amiable and agreeable — Hannah's  
 fear is beginning to get unwell as she  
 always does whenever she is at Weymouth  
 but she assures me she feels better to  
 day than she did yesterday evening  
 but this makes her very happy  
 which is its being determined that  
 the Sea Posters are not to take place  
 this year but Spencer has sent down  
 a Boatswain and when ever the  
 weather will permit we are to  
 Row, but Enter your friend is so  
 much afraid of any motion that  
 I do not think Papa will get her  
 to go at all — Augustus & Eliza are both  
 downing they have both had  
 Sophia & we do not intend to honour in

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the sea with our hammocks this forenoon  
 to get after all the amusement we  
 have had at Windsor this place appears  
 very dull indeed stupid and lame  
 I do not see one soul except <sup>the</sup> Sir William  
 and Lady Pitt the Pouletts and poor  
little Quet Lord & Lady Sudley —

We have been once to the Play to see  
 Kemble act and I am quite  
 quite delighted with him we are  
 going again this evening

We went this morning to call upon  
 Lady Charles Somerset she may be very  
 good natured & I believe she is, but is  
 odd a Woman I never saw before  
 the Downes we went over to call  
 to see Monday, they had just had a  
 letter from Lord Dorchester to say  
 he was setting off to go with his  
 Regiment to Ireland George Pitt is  
 gone likewise Sir William received  
 a letter from him yesterday wrote  
 in great spirits — George's stupid old

Father is now at Weymouth he looks as  
if he died three months ago & was  
taken out of his Office to come &  
show he was alive to the King —  
God Bless you my dearest dear soul  
and think of one who will  
ever be your most Affl
