My dear Brother

I write with pleasure  
 to inform you that a young  
 Woman of the name of Sutton gave  
 her a Petition yesterday stating her  
 situation as most distressing and  
 as she is Mr. Scott's Daughter and  
 your Sister Sister we promised her to  
 inform you of her situation. She  
 having claimed against her Father's  
 consent has no claim upon her  
 though recommended to her mother  
 nothing for her. Her Husband is in  
 trade & upon the point of bankruptcy  
 & this poor Woman ready to  
 & in immediate want, as the Husband  
 must give up himself. Their wish is  
 to get any place that will afford  
 them a subsistence but stating no  
 one situation whatsoever. You must

Dear my dear & Brother, I am  
aware the Queen might be better  
than it is quite out of her power  
to assist them in that way as far  
as momentary relief goes I am sure  
she will do what she can as well  
as all of us - As I am writing I have  
not time just mentioning that  
the King remained his leg getting  
some work the other day as he had  
his part in the storm. The King  
started in consequence he has not  
come out for three last two or three days  
but he is no more better to stop  
that I hope he will be able to  
to do or want. The rest of the family  
are in perfect health & desire to  
be most kindly remembered to you  
& believe me dear Brother
