I have been much troubled the
 6
 day about Brother Will I am sure he
 ought to have the Duke is better, but
 not allowed to go out of the House
 until the matter changes -
 I am now confined with a
 very disagreeable ~~state~~ all over
 me & so that which makes
 me glad for nothing - I have
 been asked for Jones's Report
 & not to go out of the House
 for some days - which I can
 only say for as I can but
 go to sleep - I have the best
 of it & nothing inclined to
 a storm - I sincerely hope
 you give ground & that
 you are beginning to regain
 your strength & that you
 feel yourself better for the

change of air, but being sent to the
cold & for God sake don't put your
nose out of the door as long
as this cold wind lasts - I see
the King is ill & very seriously
so with attacks in the lungs
I will explain that London
is as dull as a picture - but
one thing you may see -
I have little or no news
to tell you I must to my
study tomorrow unless I find
sufficiently attend & lastly
I am not equally so - I have
had a new book read from
very happy unless I thought
to have something particularly well
of the year or good account of some
William at some time with me

of being unwell & I thought
out of spirits - I wish I was in
high good strength & could
away as usual - God bless
my blind Buttons I hope the
same is more that you are
in, & that the large Parliament
is giving me to your satisfaction
