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My Dearest Mary,

I have again to thank you for a very kind letter & for your attention in writing to me so fully respecting dear Amelia at a moment when it was natural I should feel particularly anxious to know that she had not suffered from her feelings, in consequence of the malignity of the distemping Cough, which I learnt yesterday, and I thank God, that, in this respect, your letters are so satisfactory. Sir H. Keble's conduct upon this sad occasion has been such as I should have expected from the Merit which the Experience of many years has given me of his Character & he must conform the Request which I put in him. Poor Sir H. Bunsard had not, I was told, received the distemping Intelligence at four o'clock yesterday afternoon & I dread the Effects which the loss of so promising a Boy must have upon Sir H. & Lady Bunsard when feelings have lately been subject to Trials so severe. The Storm must have been dreadful by your accounts, and I was glad that Sir Harry Keble is relieved from all uneasiness respecting the Yacht, the continuance of which in Harbour I cannot but approve.
