My Dear Madam,

I am happy to find from your kind letter that dear Amelia derives so much comfort from the prospect of returning here, and I need not assure you that if I had consulted only my own wish to have you both with me again, I should not have hesitated in agreeing to the proposals that she should return to Windsor; but as she suffered so much from the Journey to Weymouth, it was natural that I should dread the Return of the same Effects. — I trust however that from the additional Precautions which may be taken, those may be avoided, and Doctor Coxe assures me that he sees no objection to her Residence in her own Apartment here, which is very satisfactory to me, for, altho' I shall never suffer my own Compet. & Inclinations to interfere, where the Health of any of you is not stake, I cannot deny that any Separation from you is painful to me.
