My Dearest Mary,

Although the account contained in your kind letter of yesterday has both grieved and disappointed me, I feel thankful to you for not disguising from me any thing that regards the State of poor Amelia, when sufferings I lament no less severely than I admire the fortitude and patience with which she bears them. I had flattered myself that she had been in some measure relieved from the Violence of the Crisis in the late, but your last account has destroyed my hope in this respect, & when I consider her present state & how little she is equal to even the exertion of a short journey, it is impossible that I should not view with increasing the approaching Journey, however satisfied I may be that no Obstructions will be wanting to render it as little fatiguing as possible. - If your continued attentions, dear Amelia owes much, and they have not been lost upon.
