My Dearest Mary,

I have been very much concerned that you were unable to send me yesterday the favourable Report of dear Amelia for which I had been led to hope from the general nature of that which I received yesterday and I lament most sincerely the Reluctance of the Queen to the degree which I much apprehend from what you say. My Letters will have, I trust, convinced you & dear Amelia of my Readiness to concur in any Arrangement which may best ensure her Comfort and as you leave the Decision to me, I have spoken to the Queen who will see Doctor Cox this day & desire him to state fairly whether he does or does not object to a Residence in the Castle. If he should decide for that in preference to the House that was Doctor Liberdin's & your Brother's. Removal should nevertheless prove necessary hereafter, I have taken care to have it understood that you are not to be separated from her, I would I must add that I have found every Disposition to meet my wishes in this Respect.
