

W. Pitt Rivers Esq Nov 25<sup>th</sup> 1832

Sir  
 I have I wrote to your Royal Highness to  
 remind you of your intention of coming here  
 we have had reason I believe that the Park  
 would be disposed early in Dec. It is  
 reported that and they had mentioned the  
 2<sup>d</sup> of Dec. to one Penn; others have mentioned  
 the 4<sup>th</sup> others the 7<sup>th</sup> as the day of the Operation.  
 It is quite certain that the Gov<sup>t</sup> have appointed  
 their Committee for the Management of  
 their Estates; and I cannot doubt that  
 the Operation will take place early in Dec.  
 In that case we shall certainly have the  
 Borough

Electors, and shall probably have the  
County Electors before Christmas.

Considering that there will be the same reason  
in every large town in the Kingdom, and  
that travelling will be at all moments  
impracticable; and moreover that every body  
will be more or less occupied I am inclined  
to think that it would be most expedient  
that your Royal Highness should postpone your  
visit & that you should not set out till after Christmas.

In respect to the late two hurricanes  
I hear in general good accounts. I am sorry  
to say however that my opinion is not at all  
altered in respect to the effect of the Reformation.

In truth the Country is at this time  
 divided into the same Parties as it was  
 two hundred years ago. Unfortunately the  
 King and his posterity have by the alteration of  
 the Law and the Operation of the New Law given  
 the preponderance to the Democratical Party.  
 I don't think that the Country can continue to  
 maintain its Constitution, to protect the  
 Property of its Subjects and their Interests and  
 to maintain its Policy and its Power  
 under a posterity situated as ours must be  
 under the new Law.

I don't understand what is passing  
 just at present. All Parties appear to be  
 incurring the <sup>abroad</sup>

greatest possible cost, and expense for securing  
 the means of any for objects of this kind in  
 time. They power in time was for peace.  
 None more than same. Yet all the Armies  
 are on foot. All for no object.

I did not know that your Royal Highness  
 intended to prosecute the Satyrists. I thought  
 that it was the Queen.
