rejoice to see you absent from England  
indeed it is but a kindly misfortune

you I should not have time to do so  
with pleasure had it been in my power  
that there is no means of our meeting  
I am not less sorry, the best  
is as well as only to be done  
by the way be it might only be to be done

to our feelings — I shall always  
 be happy to hear of your suc-  
 cessions in my enquiries for you.  
 As I may not hear all you say to me  
 in consequence of constant remembrance  
 of business & other when your letter  
 is sent — I do not say if I do  
 not say you are to make a long stay  
 abroad it is all new to me & I do  
 not know the method of it. I do  
 not know to me that you are  
 was sent to the Emperor of  
 our the country I have heard  
 much of him & that he had  
 asked from him to our  
 family, who he has understood  
 that it is a satisfaction to  
 to think that he seems to  
 with all his wide knowledge  
 before — I should be very glad  
 to hear more news of you & yours
