

Before *q. Restoration*, *q. expense of q. State* was borne by *q. Crown*, & whenever *q. Crown Revenue* became insufficient, they were assisted by *q. People*, in *q. proportion* thought proper by *Parl.*; & whatever savings *q. Crown* could make upon supplies so granted, accrued to *q. k. himself*; After *q. Restoration* *q. k.* had *q. Tonnage & Poundage*, *q. two Excises*, *Post Office*, *Mine Licences*, & ~~half~~ ^{half} money granted him for life; these were given for $120,000$ *per An.* to support as it is said *q. dignity of q. 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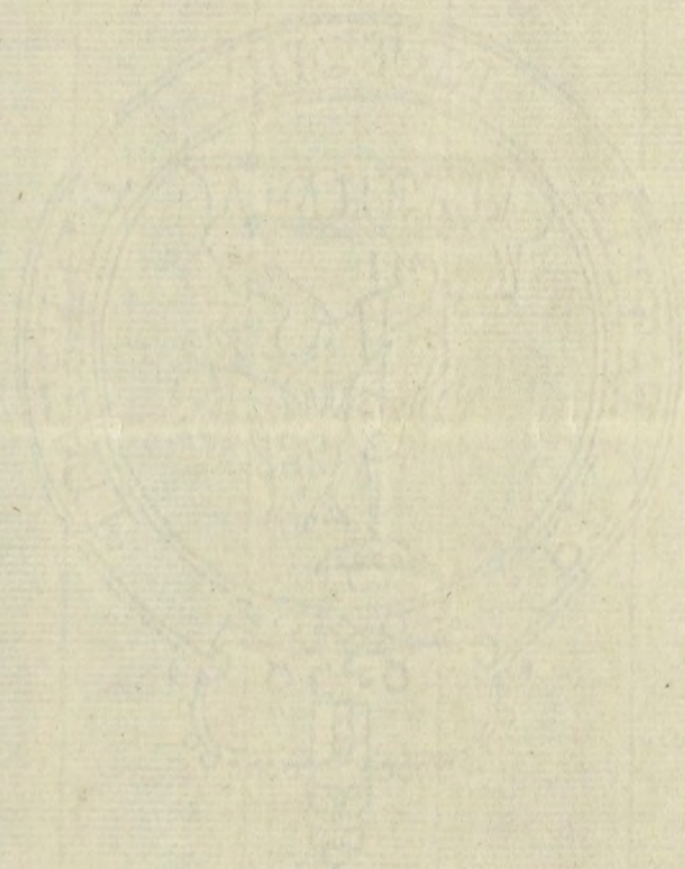
