Dear Greenwood,

I am very to plague you with this Letter, but it is in order to remind you of improving the suspension of Officers being carried thro by Lord Amhurst at the Siege on Wednesday, as we are very short of Officers & the duty comes down very quick upon them. We had a most glorious Review Yesterday, & have receiv'd the Duke's thanks & compliments in public orders, for our Regiments being in such high order & discipline, in that I do really think it is impossible for any Corps

to have made a finer Field-day. I may keep
 Pease up to his collar, & do not let an opportunity
 slip of pushing the Ministers to do me common
 justice which is all I ask for. I believe
 when I was in Town I forgot to desire you
 in the same manner to set down Dr. Seem's name
 for the vacant Curacy, if I have been so forgetful
 you will be so good as to have it rectified, and
 send for the cloathing of the Dead you must find
 one of your Clerks again to Mr. Wallis or else
 I never shall hear any thing more of ~~that~~ ^{it} till
 the season is quite over, & then it will almost
 be of no use in the world, You will I am afraid

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think that I trespass too much upon your friendly
 indulgence by ever believing you with common friends
 but you will know that your Friends are too well
 acquainted with you to apologize much to you
 for employing you ~~in any thing~~ in any thing that
 is essential to their service. Adieu my dear
