Dear Daniell,
Yesterday I received yours of 13th
instant and its various enclosures: I also received
the three accounts of expense.

Delivered to Mr. F. by the Proprietor you must ask
Father how he stands for money and how he is likely
to have in hand: because I trust he will not again
want money of Mr. Barton: if he can spare this
sum pay up all the wages of the different people
paid by Colphick and the two sums of £24.10
and £11.9 due to Colphick and Dimington for their
Shares in the Park: the remainder may be used to pay
off the Farm Bills since Christmas last: but Father
must have money enough in hand to buy stock:

I am glad the harvest is no near over: recollect I will
not have any alteration in the Park Farm or Garden
without my personal consent.

I hope my daughters are prosperly and comfortably in-
treated in the Bedley house with Mr. Har-
per: George has his bed there in the same house with
his sisters: but I cannot permit him

I will pay for his lodging in London and he may
pay you a visit at Buckingham whenever he pleases.

The Dutchess is quite well and I trust she lives
happy: I am sure she ought: she gains the hearts

of His Majesty's Managers subjects and the best
those of our country men and women: she feels very
sensibly your attention and desire, her best wishes
and compliments:

I am really quite happy & do believe otherwise I

placed: I am quite well and renewed from my far-
 -to you and indeed so I ought for next Friday I come
 with the Doctor to see the mines of the West: of
 course the Dutch provinces here: I have every rea-
 -son to be satisfied with all persons and things here
 and shall in a short time be a better judge: but
 I already hope and believe my residence on this side
 of the water will fully answer: adieu and ever
 believe me.
