Dear Sir, I am to acknowledge your letter
- today and its various enclosures: I return the
proper papers signed.

I should not be surpris'd if after all I should re-
-main at Hampton Court: either Prince's Au-
- gustus or the Dutchess. I however will give you
four and twenty hours notice to have the Horse and
Pack to the Prince and Prince of Denmark: you
cannot give any thing to either of them unless I see and
the wants of your house are back: but I think that
not likely by far before the middle of next week
the family cannot be home tho' if the men remain

I am now to be intended sailing on Sunday afternoon:
 Boston I expect here on Friday and will give you all
 the more particular directions about sending me the letters
 aboard: I think the next week's accounts had better
 be sent aboard: we cannot well be home before
 the end of September and I therefore wish Beechey
 to be ready for our reception by the twenty
 eighth of September: I shall send you by some
 letters to be regularly put away in the Library:
 I am getting slowly well: my right leg is still
 weak: the Dutch help has certainly gained strength
 and I hope after her natural air and bath and enjoying
 her relations and friends she will return to Beechey
 quite well hearty and strong: my letters will go

always just as they did during my former absence:
 For very different reasons the Dutch and my daugh-
 ters are anxious ^{to} waiting ^{for} a expedition to the Con-
 tinent: I shall have the same satisfaction at my
 return: in the mean time advise and urge believe
 me whether in or out of this island
