Dear Sir,

I do myself the pleasure to acknowledge with best thanks, your letter of the 20<sup>th</sup>, accompanying the Knightbridge accounts, and the several papers I had requested you to prepare, which were all made out in exact conformity to my wishes, and have now further to beg, that you would transmit to me those Bills of Jelles Marsh and Tatham, upon which the Bonds that are now under payment, were granted them, attaching thereto, an abstract of the amount of Capital & Interest, that has hitherto been paid thereupon, and  
John Barton Esq<sup>r</sup> next

next their last Bill which has not yet  
been examined. — I will also thank you  
to let me have a schedule of all such  
Bills of mine, now in your hands, as are  
either in part or wholly unpaid, and  
which therefore immediately appertain to  
the subject of the arrangement of my debts,  
in order that I may determine whether the  
whole, or only a part of them, should be  
put into the hands of Mr Robinson, my  
Attorney. —

I cannot conclude this  
Letter without expressing to you, the high  
sense I entertain of the uprightness and  
integrity, as well as of the talent and zeal,  
with which you have ever conducted the  
management of my Accounts, since they were  
placed in your hands, which sentiments I  
hope it will some day or other, be in my  
power

power to prove, more forcibly, than by  
words, for at any time when you  
conceive that any little interest I may  
have, can be of use to you, you may  
always command the exertion of all my  
power to the utmost of my ability  
with sentiments of friendly regard &  
genuine esteem
