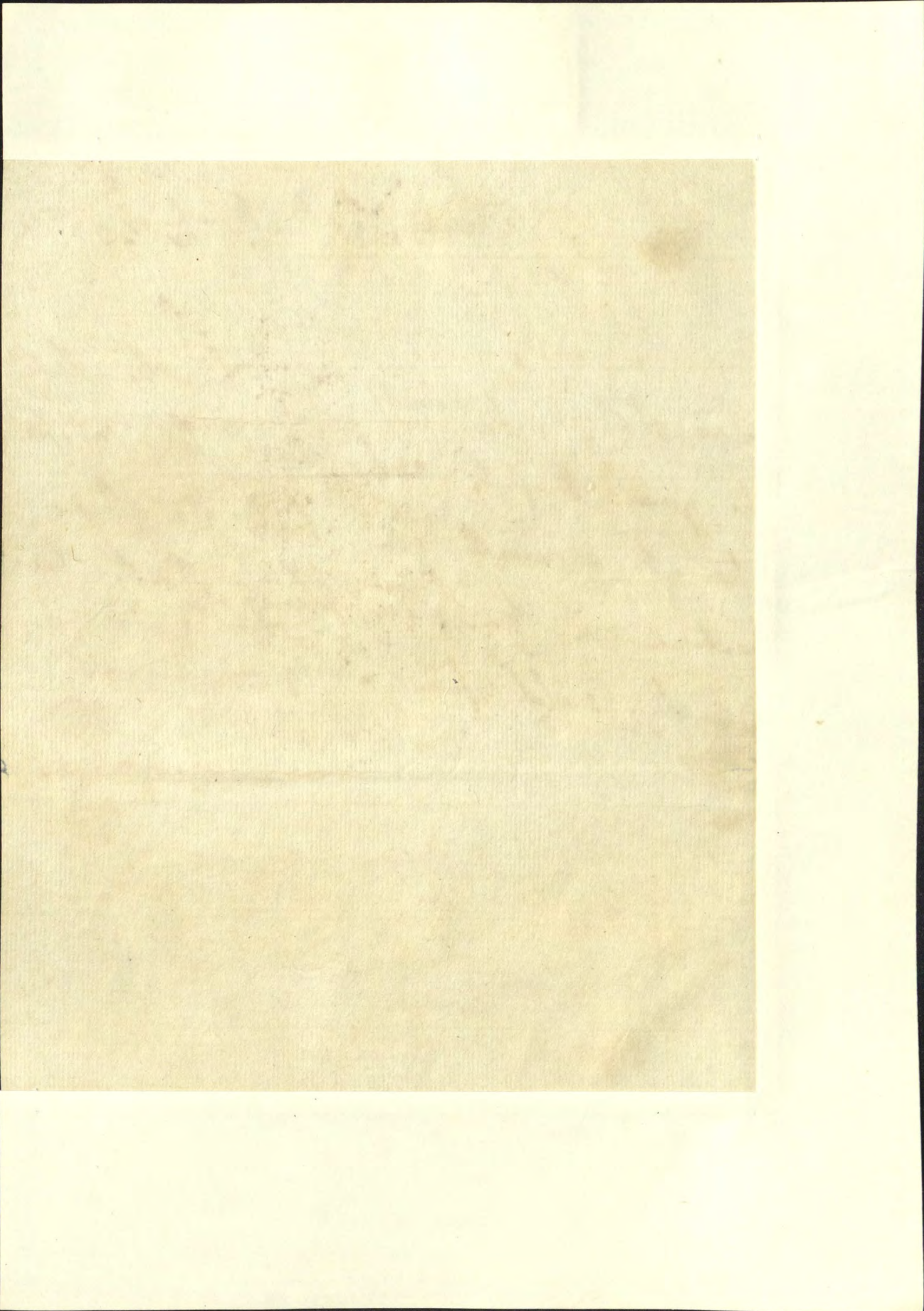

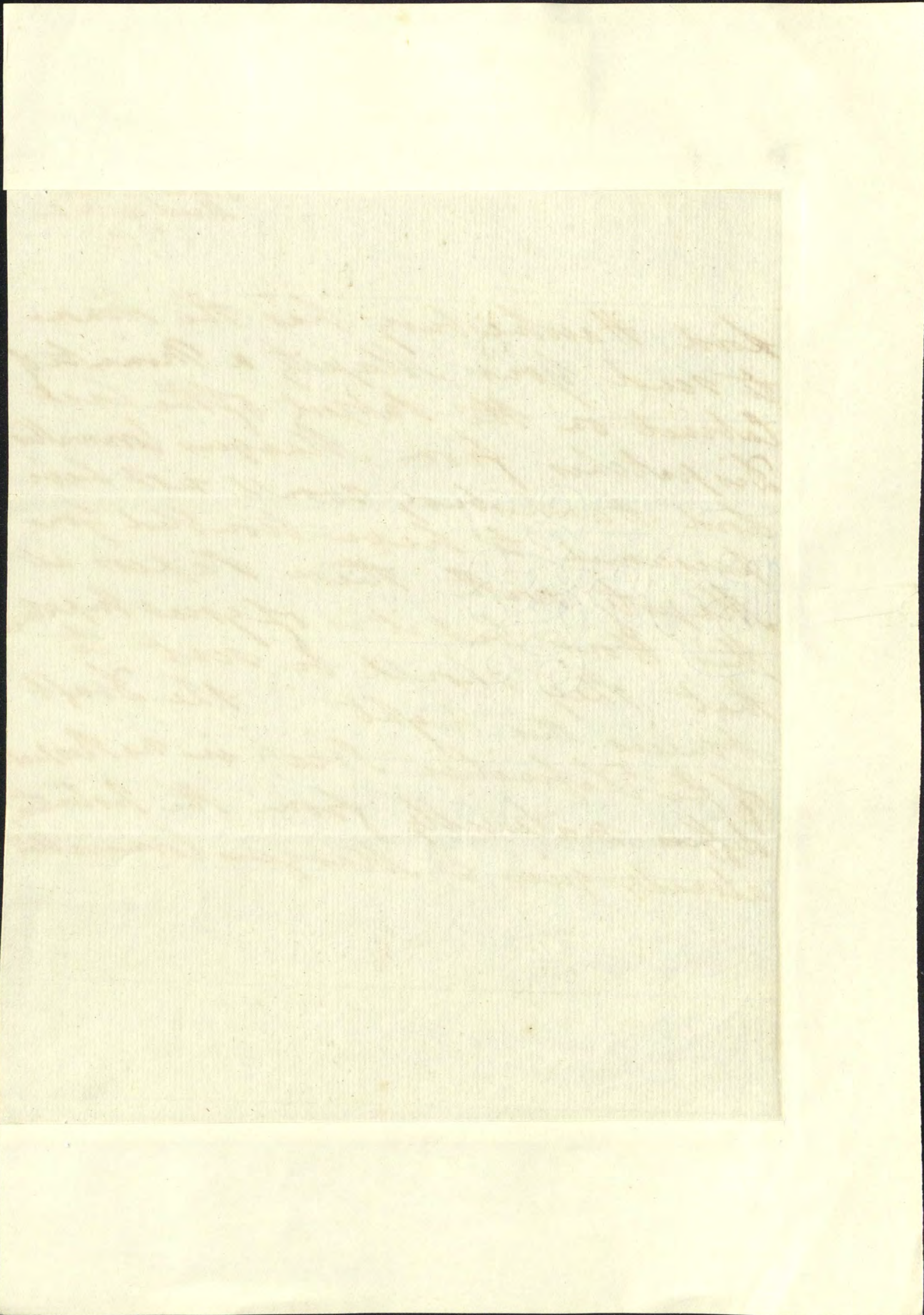

 are authorized to agree to it in its
 present form.

If the abovementioned
 Plenipotentiaries, or any of them
 should insist on any new Demands
 or refuse to sign the Treaty con-
 -formably to the enclosed Draft
 Marquis Cornwallis will inform
 the Congress that he has gone to

to the utmost extent of his Instructions
and that in obedience to the
Orders of His Court He must leave
Amiens in eight Days provided
the Treaty is not concluded within
that Time

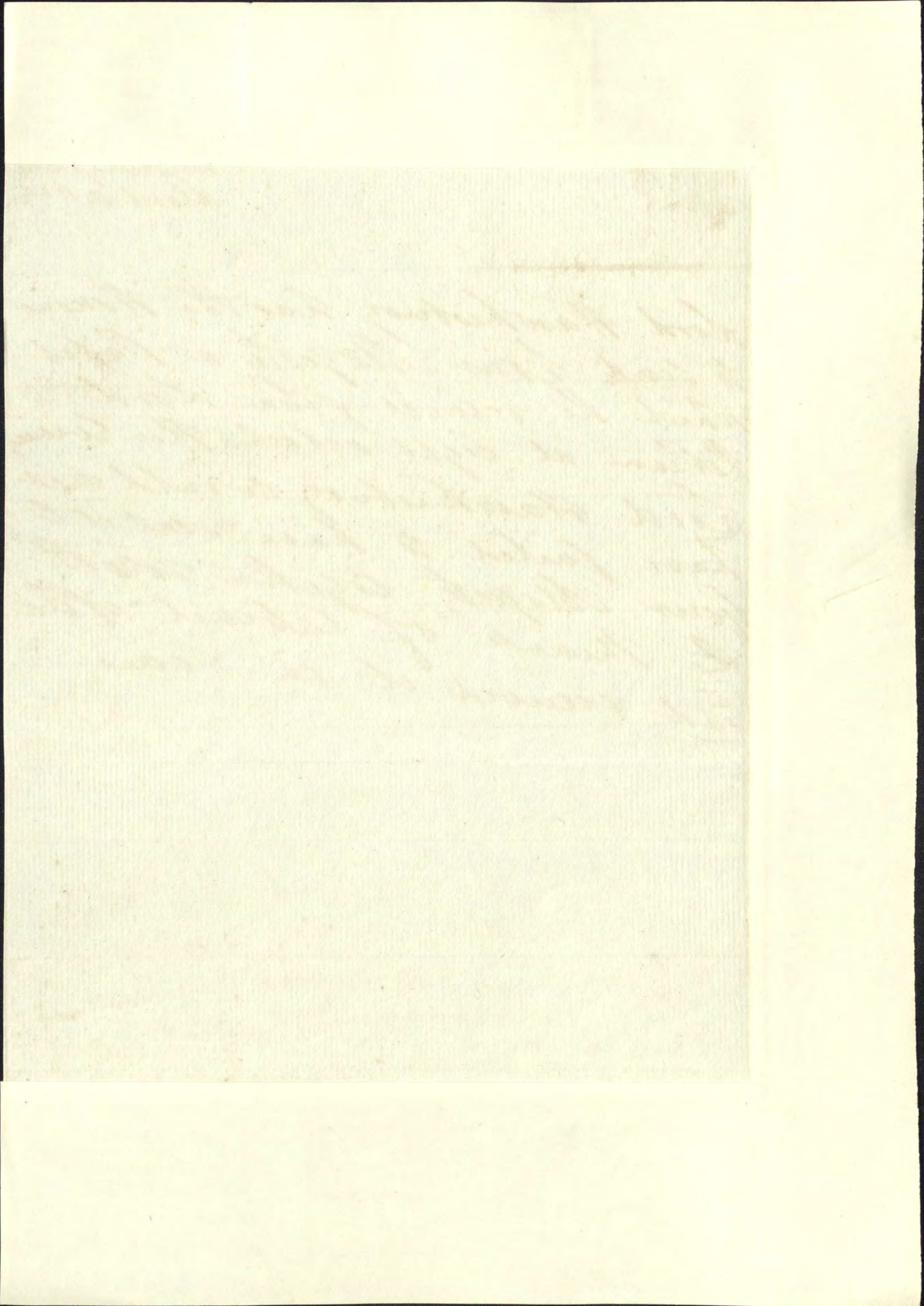

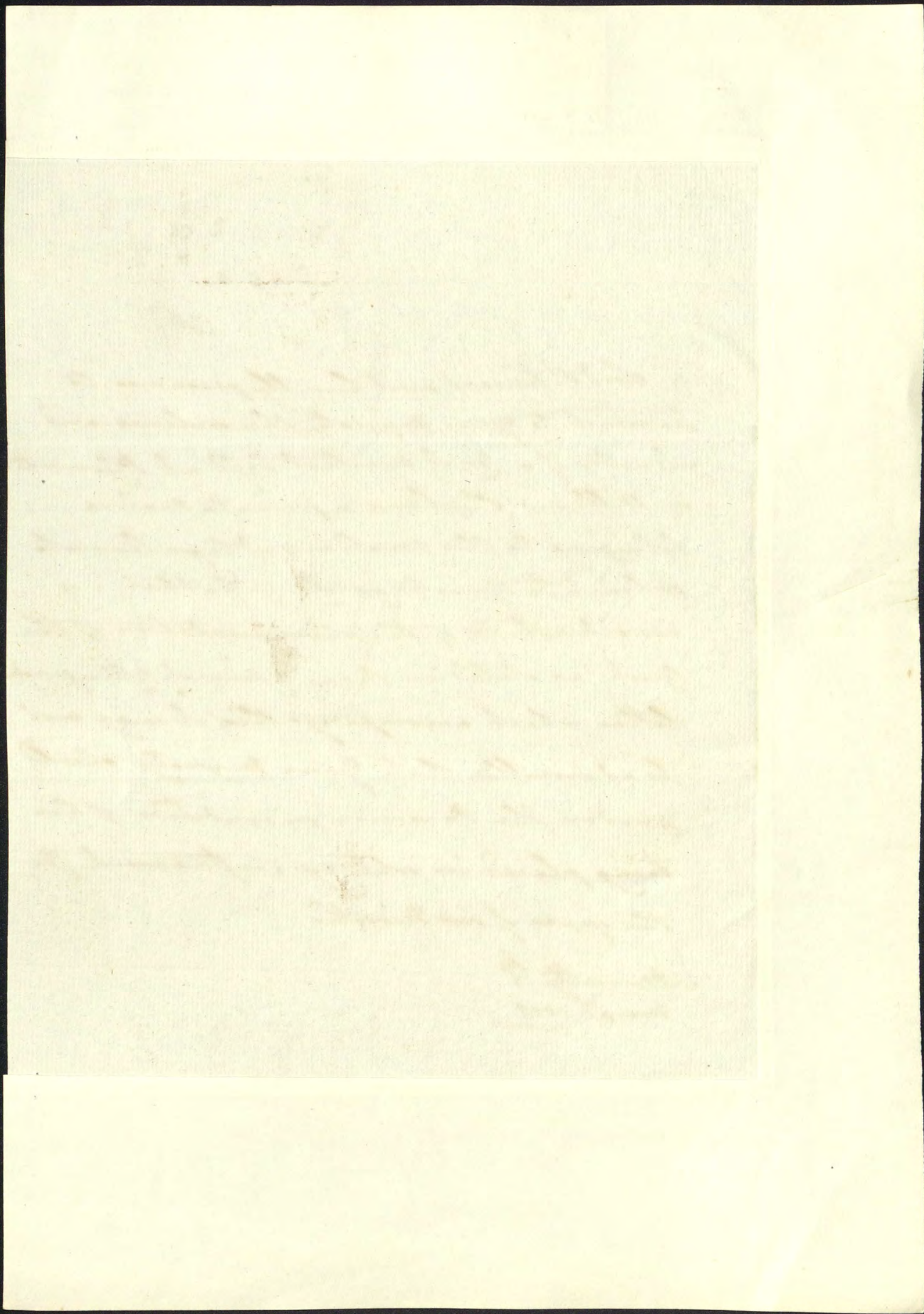

The Earl of St. Vincent has the honor of transmitting to Your Majesty a letter which has been received from Mr. Killers Paymaster of Marines on the Subject of certain frauds said to have been committed by some officers of the Chatham Division of Marines.

The information which led to the discovery of these fraudulent practices was given by a man of the name of Jewson, a Sergeant of the Division who was tried by a Court Martial some months ago, and having been found guilty of some gross offences, was drummed out of the Corps, with every mark of disgrace, the charges however stated by him, in his deposition (whatever his Character may be) were so circumstantial, that Lord St. Vincent thought it his duty

to direct a very minute examination of the Books of
the Division, and the result of that investigation, with
the deposition of Jewson is annexed to the Paymaster's
letter.

These papers with several others which have
been obtained from the Division have been laid
before your Majesty's Attorney and Solicitor General
and the Council for the affairs of the Admiralty
and on a consideration of their reports upon the
case, Lord St. Vincent most humbly submits to
your Majesty the propriety of bringing Lieut. Col.
Berkeley to a General Court Martial.

Lord St. Vincent is induced to advise, that
the Court should be assembled at Portsmouth, rather
than at Chatham, as he is sorry to observe, that Lieut.
General Innes the Commandant of that Division is
materially implicated in the transactions, which
have called for this inquiry, and begs leave to suggest,
the propriety of his being permitted to request, His
Royal Highness the Commander in Chief to order

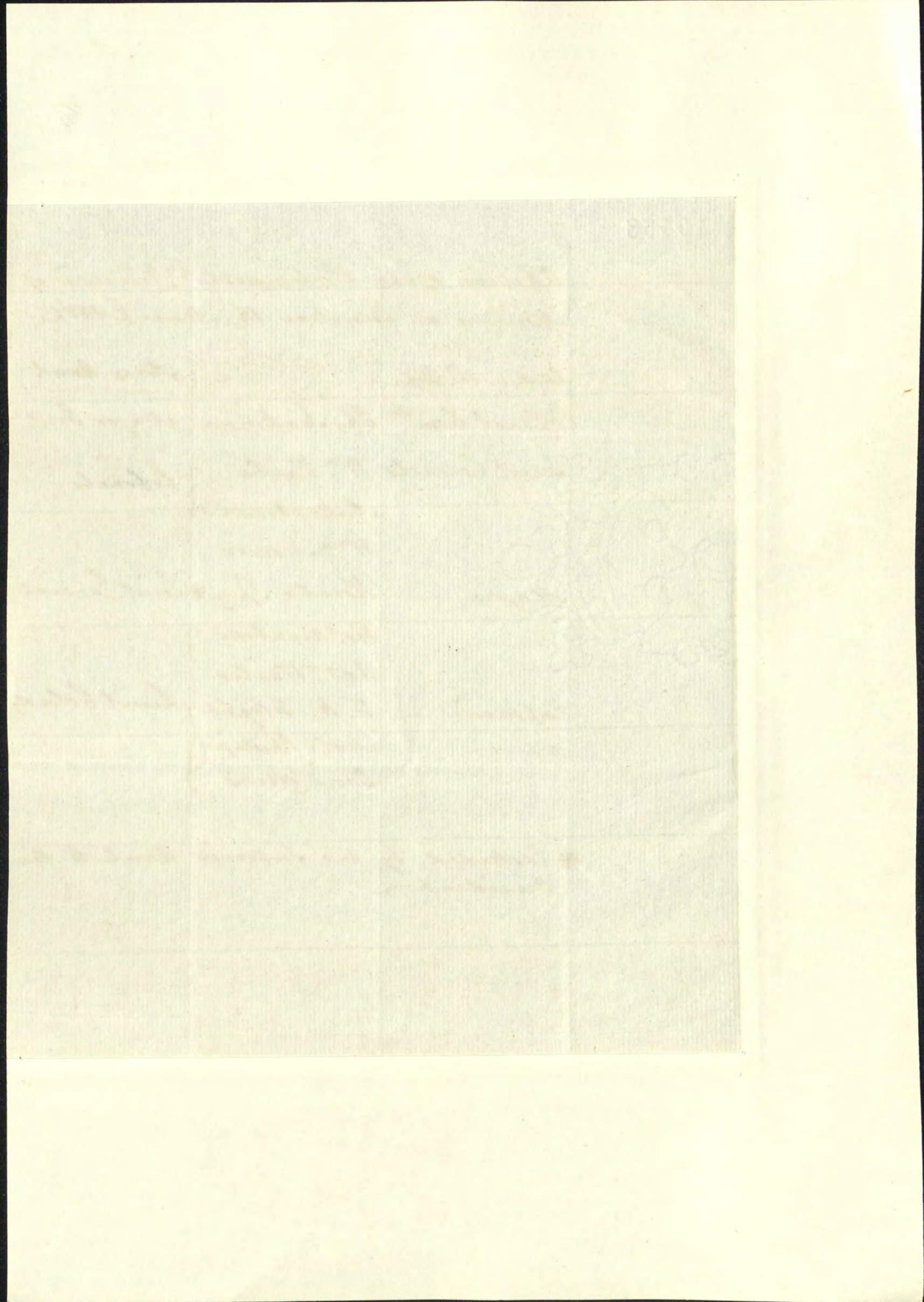

I have the honor to report to Your Majesty the death of General Maso by which the Government of Gibraltar, and the command of the 74 Regiment of Infantry are become vacant.

I trust that Your Majesty will pardon my laying before You the earnest wish of the Duke of Kent, that Your Majesty would be graciously pleased to confer upon them the Government of Gibraltar, and to allow them to resign the Chief Command in North America.

As Lord Mulhensson is only Colonel Commandant of the second Battalion of the 40th Regiment, I beg leave to propose to Your Majesty to promote them to the Command of the 74 Regiment.

Should Your Majesty be pleased to approve of this arrangement, and was there a prospect of the

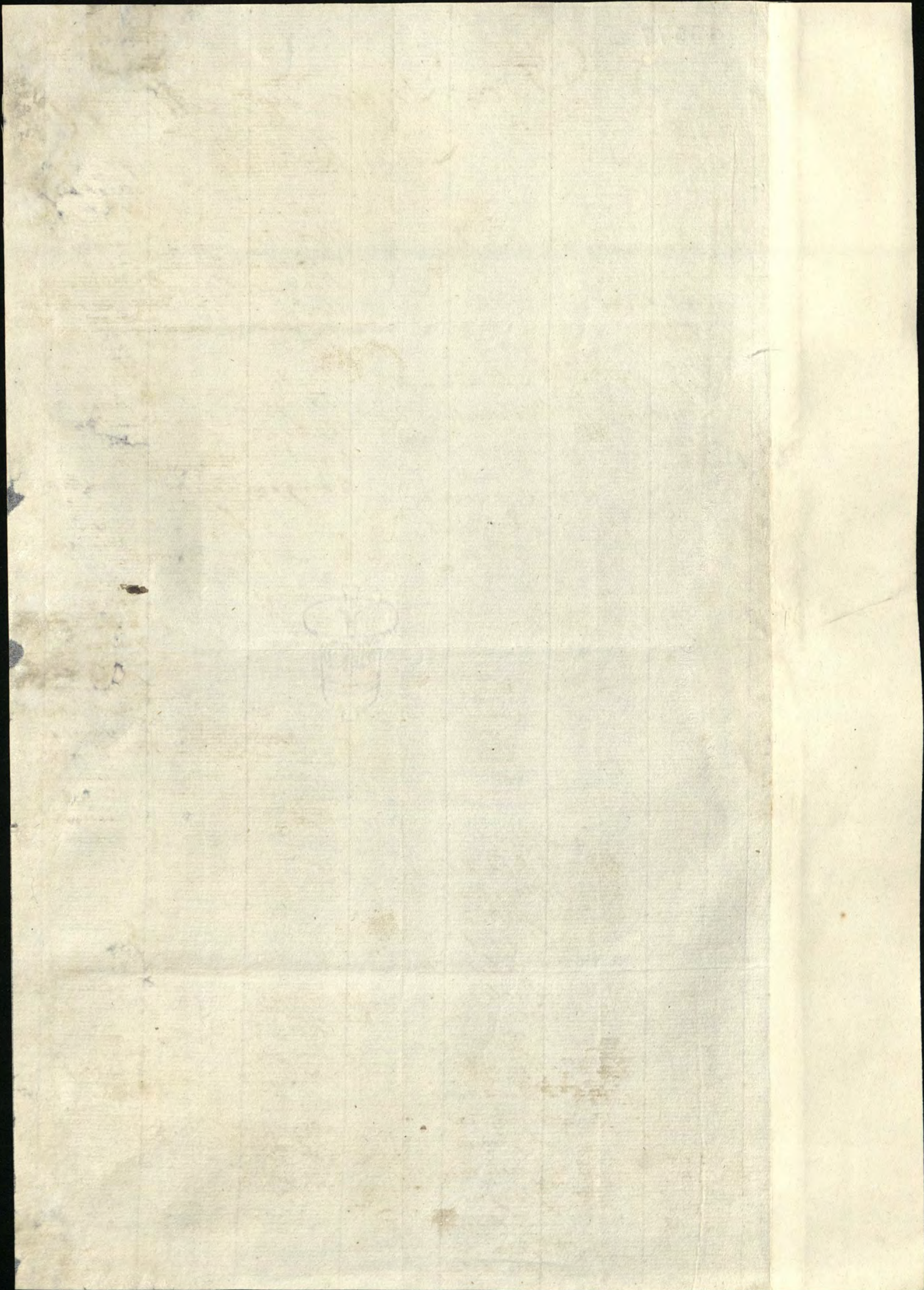

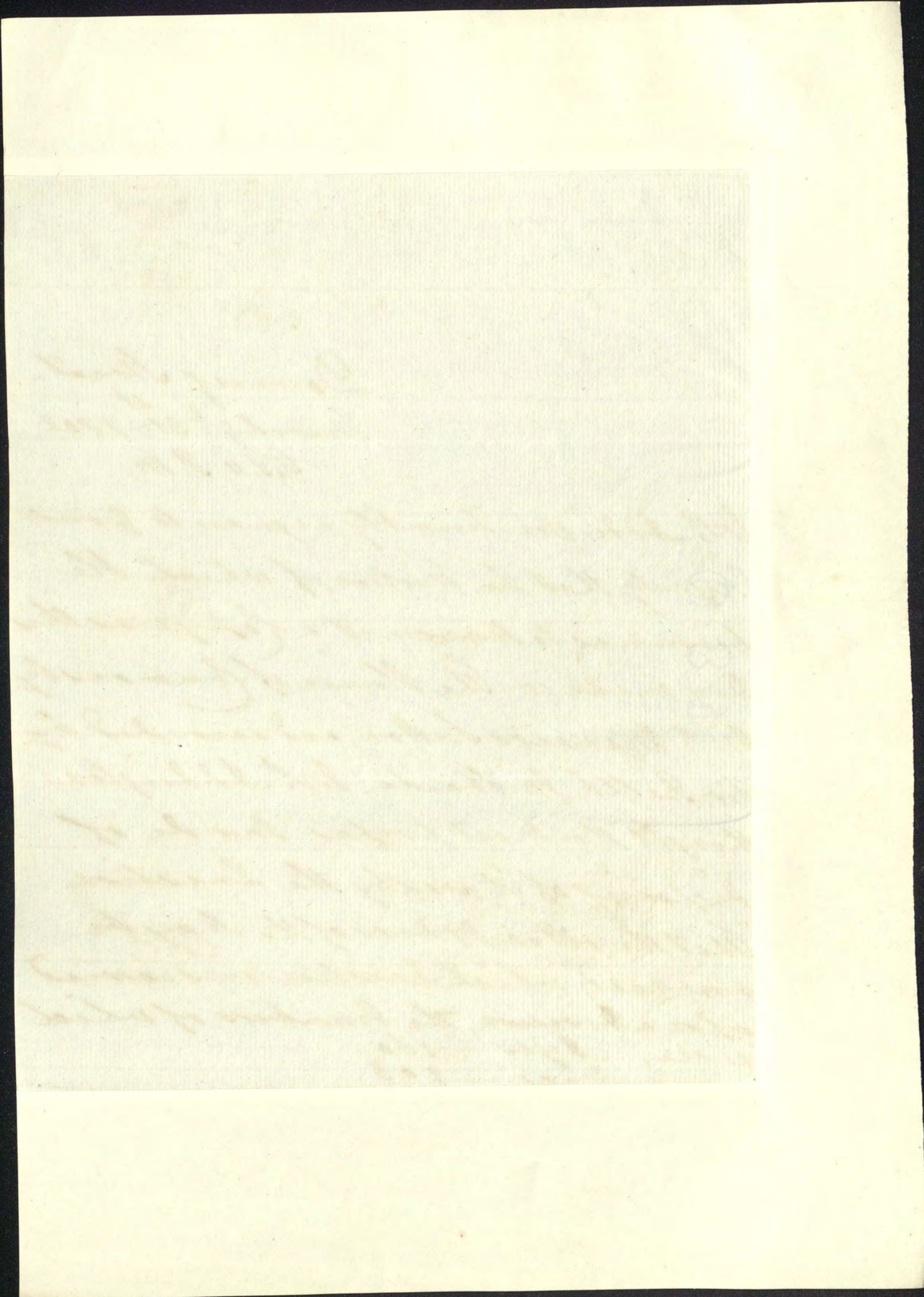
