Sire

It is with the greatest reluctance that I am compelled to solicit your Majesty's attention, which I state, as shortly as I can, some circumstances, which of late have made me for the first time in my life feel uneasy in the presence of your Majesty. After forty two years of steady and unvaried support of your Majesty's measures and government and after nineteen years of attendance in a situation that I hold of your Majesty's goodness and which appears to me to derive its chief value from the more immediate access it gives to the Royal presence. I cannot but deeply lament that any thing should have occurred to induce the necessity of my troubling your Majesty about matters personal to myself, however interesting they may be to me and my family. — Your Majesty's Ministers have declared their determination to oppose the reelection of my son Colonel Stewart in the County of Wigton: In his parliamentary capacity no objection can be taken to him, and his professional zeal and talents, a father generally thinks, are such as to recommend to that seat in Parliament, which has generally been filled, by some one or other of my family. At least there is nothing new in the attempt, and at present I have the honor to be your Majesty's Lieutenant in that County. — Your Majesty's Ministers are equally hostile to my views for another son W^m Montgomerie Stewart in the Shire of Kirkcubright where my family has had the influence of property for many centuries, and in its Lord has the honor to be your Majesty's Lieutenant. — When I look back to the uniform tenor of my political conduct, I might appeal with all humility to your Majesty so be that it has not been

such as to give me some claim to the support of your Majesty's servants in these contents.
On the contrary I am marked as an object of their opposition, and in a recent instance
they have wounded my feelings, because it involves character. I had a promise from one of
your Majesty's Ministers, that a Gentleman of an old and respectable family in the Shire of
Midlothian; some of whom have formerly represented it in Parliament and many of whom have
born and still continue to bear arms in the service of your Royal Ancestors and of your
Majesty, should be recommended to your Majesty as deserving of the honor of a Baronetage.
To that Gentleman I have been led to commit myself, upon what I deemed the best
authority, by informing him of the prospect and pleasure I had in being instrumental
to procure him this mark of your Royal favor. I am now given to understand that my
friend and relation is not to be mention'd to your Majesty as a fit person to receive the
honor in question, under these mortifying circumstances I cannot resist the strong
impulse which prompts me to throw myself at the feet of my gracious Sovereign and
most humbly to request that your Majesty will be pleased to permit me to resign
into your Majesty's hands the place I have the honor to hold in your Majesty's
Bedchamber, I beg leave at the same time to assure your Majesty that before
from your Majesty's presence penetrated with the profoundest and most
unalterable sentiments of gratitude, respect and attachment to your Majesty's person,
sentiments which any words of mine are inadequate to express, but which are so intimately
blended with the best and strongest feelings of my heart, that they will afford me consolation
under the pressure of political wrong and personal disappointment, and throw a ray
of pleasing recollection over the latest hours of a life which has been devoted

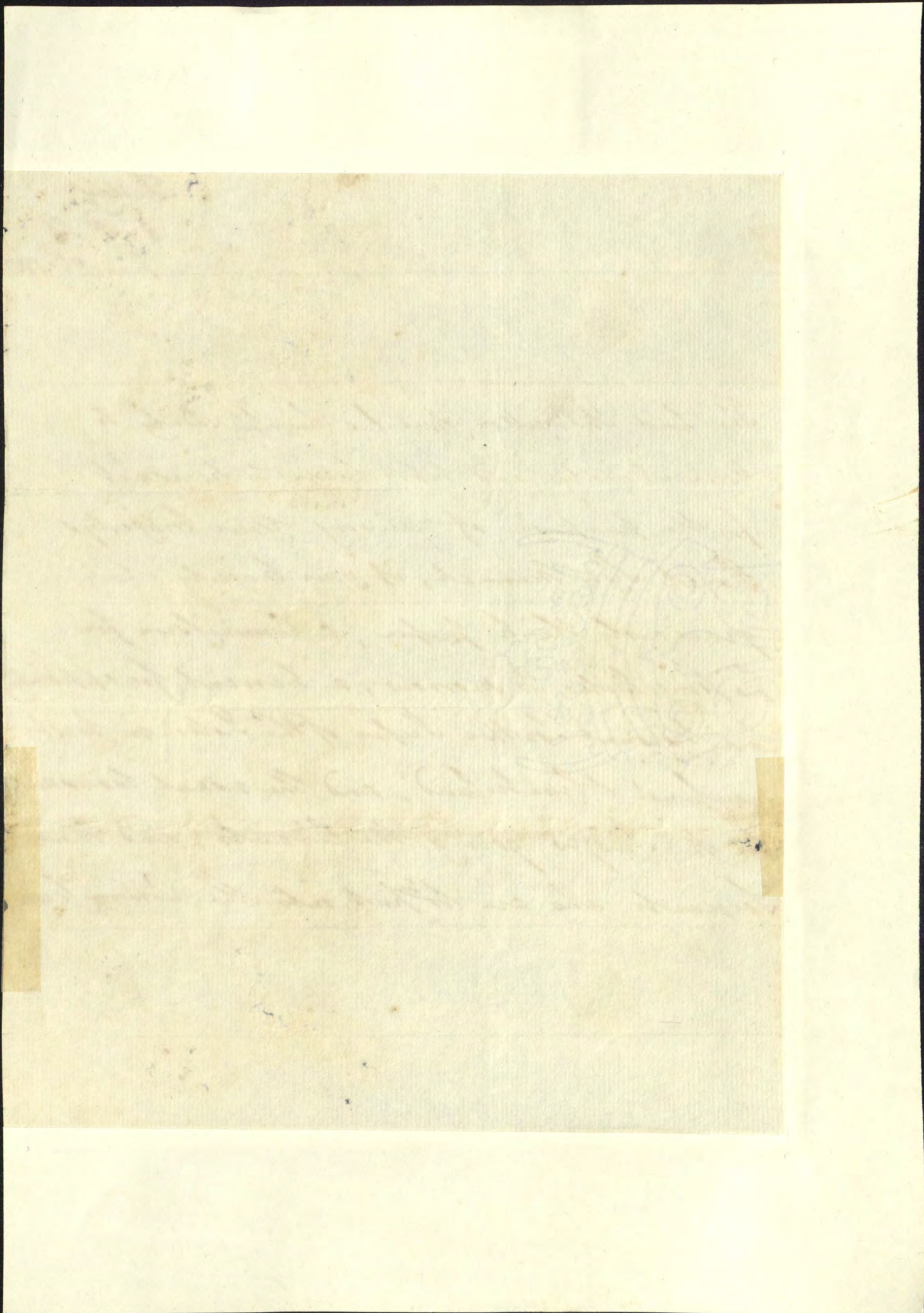
