Lord Holdernesse, The hearing that the slight indisposition
 of my Eldest Son is quite removed gives me the greatest satisfaction
 if You are able to give as good an account of them tomorrow
 as You did when I had the pleasure of seeing You on Thursday
 last, You would bring them both and Mr. Smelt as soon as
 You have dined tomorrow, that every thing regarding the
 House at New may be on the spot face, which will be the
 means of having every thing settled to the convenience of
 all that attend them. I shall order one of my equipages
 to be ready at the hour You shall appoint; You will therefore
 tomorrow Morning send Your Orders to my Clerk of the Stables.
