

Having carefully Measured and Examined the Old Buildings of His Majesty's Lodge at Richmond we are humbly of Opinion that it would be for His Majesty's service to take up all the Lead Gutters, Plates, Hips, Ridges, Pipes, and other Lead work, and weigh and deliver them to the Plumber, and all the Ironwork (except the Locks and Window fastenings) to the Smith at the Contract Price of the Board of Works, and to reserve all the Stone Work, Slates, and Locks that are good for the use of a new Building.

And if the said Old Buildings are to be immediately pulled down we are of Opinion that the Bricks should be taken down and cleaned, and those that are sound and good may be used in a new Building, and the Tiling taken away - the Purchaser being at all the Expence of taken down, cleaning, and moving the said Bricks & Tiles.
