Dear Sister

As Sir Robert Keith has obtained permission to visit Dresden  
in his way to Vienna, I thought it might be agreeable to have him  
call at Zell, besides it gives me a safe conveyance of this letter part  
of which I should not have chosen to trust to the Common Post.  
Your letters seem to point out how much Denmark still employs  
your mind, as far as relates to the health, education and welfare  
of your children I shall undoubtedly take every method of  
satisfying your curiosity, but any further than that can only serve  
to keep your mind in a state of disquietude that can never be of  
any advantage and must be detrimental to your health. Whenever  
the present horrid people that manage that King dom are  
either removed by death or the intrigues of some new party  
it cannot avail any thing in your favour; but your leading an  
exemplary life will by degrees turn the cry in your favour and  
will hereafter make your son step forward in defence of his  
Mother; I doubt but many dissatisfied people will try to make up  
to you but I trust you will not give ear to their proposals, others  
will be encouraged by the Danish Court to sound you with no  
other
