## 1. Orders as to Carlton House

His Majesty having declared his intention to take the Furniture of Carlton House, which belonged to the late Princess Dowager of Wales at a value set upon it by Broadbarn and his Assistant, whose Inventory and Appraisement are now copying for His Majesty's use; Lord North will be pleased to remind His Majesty of giving orders for the taking care of the Furniture from the 25.<sup>th</sup> of this instant December and paying the Quit-rents, Taxes, and Servants whom he shall think fit to employ in the House after that time.

For the Goods being now disposed of there is no reason to burthen the late Princess's personal Estate with any expence on account of Carlton House.

## 2. Gifts to Servants

Since the Linnen and other Effects of the late Princess have been given to those of her Servants who had the custody of them will it not be equal and proper, that the Furniture of the Coffee Room in the care of M.<sup>r</sup> Tuill, and the Kitchen Furniture in the care of the Cooks should be disposed of in like manner in gifts to those Servants &c. If this be approved of the several Articles shall be taken out of the Inventories and Appraisements.

## 3. Money in the King's hands belonging to the late Princess.

The Money remaining in M.<sup>r</sup> Martin's hands after paying all the Princess's Debts which are satisfied is not sufficient to defray the charges already incurred in the Administration of her affairs will it not be therefore proper that Lord North should receive of Her Majesty what money His Majesty found among the Princess's papers and other things out from Carlton House to the end that such money may be applied as far as it shall be wanted to answer the deficiency of the fund in M.<sup>r</sup> Martin's hands.
