Sir Mont. Brillant August 17th 1701

As I am persuaded Your Majesty will be impatient to hear how the visit at Breuvie passed off, I am obliged to take this opportunity of the common post to send Your Majesty these few lines of information. His Royal Highness arrived there on the 10th & left it on the 15th inst; it is almost impossible for me to describe to Your Majesty the joy & satisfaction, which Her Royal Highness expressed upon seeing the Prince, & I flatter myself Your Majesty will receive the most favourable report from Her Royal Highness, as she more than once confessed to me, that the Prince far surpassed what she had heard of him, & that she found him much more formed in respect to his manners & appearance than she had been taught to expect of him. The Duke exerted himself in shewing every mark of politeness &

attention to His Royal Highness, & did every thing
in his power to make his stay ^{at Brunswick} agreeable to him.

The Prince took every opportunity to engage in
conversations with him upon military topics,
to which the Duke lent himself very readily, & was
very much pleased (as he expressed himself
to me afterwards,) with the Questions His Royal
Highness put to him, & with the improvement
he shew'd to gain information upon points
relative to his Profession.

The Court was very splendid & gay upon
the occasions; Her Royal Highness, the Dutchesse
Dowager was just returned from paying her
annual visit to the King at Berlin: La Margrave
de Bareuth, the Abbess of Gandersheim, &
Princeps Frederic did not a little contribute
to the gaiety of the Court by their cheerfulness &
good humour.

His Royal Highness continues to enjoy a
perfect good state of health, & as all the
