Sir Hanover Octob: 5th 1782

I take the first opportunity of acquainting Your Majesty with His Royal Highness's return to this place after having completed His excursion to the different Courts in this neighbourhood. I can venture to assure Your Majesty that everything went off perfectly well, & that His Royal Highness met with the most flattering reception from all parts, each Court vying with one another in shewing their thankfulness for this mark of His Royal Highness's attention towards them. As His Royal Highness informs me that He proposes sending Your Majesty a very full detail of the whole of this expedition, it will be totally unnecessary for me to enter into any particulars. I think it however my duty to propose to Your Majesty, that upon our future expeditions His Royal Highness sh^d

take some medical assistance with Him on account
of the frequent attacks of the Glandular swellings
at His neck & throat, which affect Him upon
very slight cold, & which have happened twice
to Him upon this last expedition, the first time
at Capel, & the second time upon the Rhine.
I cannot sufficiently describe to Your Majesty
the anxiety, & alarm which I felt upon these
~~two~~ occasions. for although, (Thank God) they gave
way to the warm applications of hot vinegar &
water, & are perhaps more tremendous in appearance
than in reality, yet I cannot feel myself at my
ease without having some medical assistance
at hand, in case of any proper necessity. I hope
therefore Your Majesty will take an opportunity
of endeavouring to persuade His Royal Highness
to listen to this proposal to which at present
He seems not to be much inclined. if His Royal
Highness should be advise to having His own Surgeon

sent over, on account of the difficulty attending
His being received in company here, one of an
inferior kind might be easily found who would
answer the above purpose, it will be easy enough
to find one here of that description; in these
attacks His Royal Highness complains of a
swelling in the passage of the throat, which
renders the respiration extremely difficult &
labourious, but which is almost, at least he thinks,
instantly relieved by warm applications. I have
been thus particular in giving Your Majesty the
above detail, that I may not be found wanting
in my duty to Your Majesty, though I flatter myself,
that it is not of any serious consequence.
I think it proper to inform Your Majesty that I have
received a letter from Sr Tho^s Wroughton Your Majesty's
minister at Stockholm, to acquaint me that it is
the King of Sweden's intention to take Hanover in this
way to the Baths at Pisa, I have accordingly acquainted
the Regency with this information that they may be
prepared for His Majesty's reception - Sr Tho^s

Wroughton requested His Majesty's permission to give notice of this His intention to The Regency of Hanover but was forbid by His Majesty, who told Him He wd do Him a great pleasure in taking no notice of it. His Majesty proposed setting out abt the 25th or 28th of last month.
