Dear Sister

I yesterday received your letter without date concerning  
M<sup>r</sup>. de Kageneck which does not paint the acquisition to be  
made of the new Austrian Minister as very charming.

Prince Fredericks of Mecklenburg and his excellent Wife are  
here they have been twice for some days with us in the Country  
I quite subscribe to the picture you had made me of him  
his vivacity is prodigious but he seems to have a fund of Religion  
and good nature; as to her she is as estimable a Woman as I  
ever knew; I shall certainly ever think with pleasure of having  
acquaintance. She seems desirous of meeting  
with my Dear Fredericks before she returns home; as he  
proposes being at Brunswick about Christmas, if it is not  
disagreeable to you I should wish he should be there at the  
same time; but then as both are a little shy unless you make  
them talk together they will not of themselves grow acquainted
